Parents Urged To Register Children

Kingsolvers To Speak 4,000 Expected For Assembly Of Ky. Christian Churches

Over 4,000 members of the Christian Church of the Disciples of Christ in Kentucky are expected to register for the 1968 Assembly of the Kentucky Association of Christian Churches which will be held May 14, 15, and 16 in the First Christian Church, Louisville.

Dr. and Mrs. Wendell R. Kingsolver will speak on Wednesday, in 1963 they, with their three children, volunteered under the Congo Protestant Relief Agency, and served in a hospital in the Democratic Republic of Congo.

The president of the International Convention of Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ) will be the bible lecturer for the Assembly. He is Ronald E. Osborn, Indianapolis, vice president and dean of the Christian Theological Seminary there.

The emphasis on evangelism will be stressed.

Federal Grant Total \$127,947

Fleming County, Kentucky (Component Grant - Conduct and Administration) Fleming, Nixon, Barb, Bracken, Meroles, Montgomery, Nicholas, and Robertson counties have received a federal grant of \$127,947 for a 10 month Conduct and Administration program.

This late remainder of a full year grant. The announcement was made today by Laverne V. Sanchez, Director, Middle Atlantic Region, OEO.

The applicant agency is the Licking Valley Community Action Program, Inc., and the local share of the grant is \$18,836. This brings the total program for the 10 month period to \$146,783.

(Special to The Mercury) New York-Few of the changes that will be taking place in Nicholas County during the next few years can be predicted with any degree of assurance - but there is one that can be.

It is that an unprecedented wave of young people in the local area will suddenly be reaching adulthood, looking for a wife and large ward of goods and services.

Because of their unusually large number, they will have a noticeable impact on the local economy.

It is a family expansion in the number of young adults is traceable to the baby boom that followed World War II. Now, two decades later, those babies are today's new adults.

At the present time, according to Government data, there are some 627 young men and women locally between the ages of 20 and 24, the young adult bracket.

Way of comparison, in that age group in 1960 there were only 379. Over the next three or four years, most of them may be expected to marry and set up households of their own. The added amount of spending that will be generated in the process will be of great importance to the local business community.

The facts and figures come from the Census Bureau, from National Economic Research Associates, consulting economists, and from market studies made for Modern Bride, a publication.
