

Farmers Urged To Help Children Under 16 Remain In School

Farmers were urged today by the Department of Labor to help boys and girls under 16 to finish their education. At the same time, the farmers will be obeying the law.

The child labor provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act prohibit youngsters under 16 from working on a farm during school hours while school is in session.

The law applies equally to migrant and migrant youth.

"Farmers can still hire teenagers under 16 to work after school and on the weekends in non-hazardous jobs. This will help needy boys and girls earn the money necessary to stay in school," the Labor Department's Wage-Hour Field Office Supervisor, Lillard Price, in Lexington observed.

"This law offers the individual farmer a real chance to contribute to the betterment of our society and our country," Mr. Price pointed out.

"The farmer who encourages these youngsters to stay in school while they work part-time for him will never

have to feel that he knowingly did not help someone out of the vicious cycle of poverty."

Labor Department studies show how violations of this law are common. It is involved—almost half of the young farm workers were below the norm for their area, and below the norm for their age, and 10 percent of 15- and 16-year-old migrant farm youth, had not received the grade normal for their ages.

6 Governmental Units Operate in Local Area

(Special To The Mercury) New York, N.Y.—How many governmental bodies are in operation in Nicholas County to administer the affairs of the local population? How many, by way of comparison, have other communities across the country set up for that purpose?

According to a special survey conducted by the Census Bureau, more agencies are used locally to carry out the business of government, than in any other area.

The facts and figures are brought out in a 46-page report released by the Department of Commerce under the title "1967 Census of Government." It is the first such study since 1962.

They are conducted every five years to determine what it takes, in number and makeup of governmental units, to provide residents of each area with

school services, water supply, police and fire protection, sanitation, health and welfare needs and the various other required services.

In Nicholas County, it is shown, these functions are carried on through six governmental bodies, four of which have property-taxing powers. In 1962 the number was five.

A breakdown of the total reveals there is one municipal government, one independent school district, one county government and three special county government and three special districts.

In terms of population the number of these public agencies is above that found in most localities, the survey shows. Locally, there is one such agency for every 960 residents.

Nationally, there were 81,253 local governments in the United States at the beginning of last year, a decrease of almost 10,000 since 1962.

number of school districts, which dropped from 34,078 in 1962 to 21,792 in 1967, it came chiefly from wide-spread school reorganization and consolidations.

On the other hand, the number of special districts—those concerned with public housing, flood control, soil conservation, bridges, toll roads and the like, increased by nearly 3,800 in the five-year period.

VA Questions

Question: I will be 24 years old on August 30. On September 16 I will begin my first year of undergraduate study. Will I be given a deferment to obtain my degree?

Answer: Under the new Selective Service Regulations your local board may grant you a deferment for the next school year, provided you have made satisfactory progress and you are certified as being enrolled full time. Upon satisfactory completion of your third year of college your local board will review your progress and will make a determination in light of current instructions whether a deferment is in order.

Q—I have just received my dividend check on my National Service Life Insurance policy. This surprised me because I have not paid premiums on this policy for the past nine months because a waiver of premiums has been in force. This waiver was granted because I am considered to be totally disabled and unemployable. Has a mistake been made? Will I have to refund the dividend?

A—No. The payment of this dividend to you is proper. Dividends on participating government life insurance policies are payable even though the policy is in a waiver of premiums.

Q—Under what conditions can a peacetime veteran be admitted to a Veterans Administration hospital for treatment for a non-service connected disability?

A—Veterans who were discharged or retired for disability incurred or aggravated in line of duty, or have a service connected disability, may be admitted to VA hospitals for disease or injury not related to their military service, if beds are available. Peacetime service after Jan. 31, 1955 is considered the same as wartime service for purposes of hospitalization and domiciliary care.
