## WHAS Crusade For Children

Retarded and emotionally ill children in Kentucky Department of Mental Health facilities will benefit from \$45,191 in grants from the 1968 WHAS Crusade for Children. Department officials gave details after grants totaling \$334,878 to 50 Kentucky and Indiana children's agencies were announced.

The Department's Children's Unit at Central State Hospital, Louisville, is the only facility in the state that provides for emotionally disturbed children.

Frankfort State Hospital and School for the retarded received almost \$13,000 from the WHAS drive. The money will be used for recreational and occupational therapy equipment, including liftable wheelchairs.

Outwood State Hospital and School for the retarded, Dawson Springs, received more than \$6,000 for sheltered workshop materials.

The Department's Diagnostic and Evaluation Service in Frankfort received a \$2,500 grant for equipment, paving and fencing for an outside recreation area.
