Income Tax Hints

Lexington, Ky.—Here's a 1968—and the need to face up to income tax report filing season.
But, says S.J. Allen, Cooperative Extension Service tax specialist, you can help yourself by taking farm-business deductions to which you are entitled. The following list may help:
(1) Fertilizer, seed, and other chemicals are deductible items. But, so are farm and feed organizations dues, farm magazine subscriptions, and business expenses (telephone, farm buildings and long-distance farm telephone calls).
(2) Record-keeping service fees, consultant fees, a cabinet or safe, and fuel farm-business property taxes.
(3) Depreciation on equipment.
(4) And if your farm was hit by a crop or animal-injury catastrophe, are deductible. Keep costs after-ward claim all legitimate deductions you have, Mr. Allen warns.

Beef Cattle Short Course To Be Held At U.K. Feb. 15

The annual beef cattle short course sponsored by the University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service will be at the Student Center here Thursday, February 15.
Dr. Bernard Jones, beef cattle specialist with the service, says the season opens at 9 a.m. (local time) with registration.
Two of the principal speakers for the one-day session are Henry P. Armstrong, Springfield, Ind., beef cattle breeder, and Dr. R.A. Long, University of Georgia animal sciences department head and former U.K. staff member. Armstrong will speak on "Making Money With Beef Cows." Dr. Long will talk on evaluating live beef cattle for maturing or muscling. Armstrong attended Purdue University and now runs a 2,500-acre hay and pasture-type operation of commercial Hereford and registered herd and quarter-horse breeding. Dr. Long is a graduate of Ohio State University, was the U.K. livestock judge and a speaker on beef production techniques.

Burley tobacco markets operating in the last Tuesday at Lexington, Kentucky and Weaon, Missouri. Sales are scheduled for the annual of the week daily at Weaon, Missouri and on Thursday at Lexington.
Gross sales Monday with only Weaon, Missouri and Carrollton, Kentucky operating totaled 358,948 pounds and averaged \$65.79 per hundred, reports the Federal-State Market News Service. Weaon sales were brought to \$52,744,522 pounds averaging \$71.54. The Association received 22.5 per cent of Monday's gross sales. For the season 11.5 per cent of total marketings has been placed under Government bond.
The Carrollton market closed for the season Monday.
