Burley Growers Vote On Quotas Next Week

Nicholas County farmers who grow burley tobacco got a last-minute reminder today about the marketing quota vote to be conducted by mail during the period February 28 - March 1, 1968.

Any person 18 years of age or older who is owner, operator, shareholder or sharecropper—shared in the 1967 crop of burley tobacco or its proceeds is eligible to vote in the referendum. Also, each person 18 years of age or older who was either the owner or operator of a farm for which a 1967 tobacco acreage allotment was established is eligible to vote, even though no tobacco was actually produced on the farm in 1967. If an allotment was established for the farm for 1968.

A ballot will be mailed to each person 18 years of age or older known to have had an interest in the 1967 crop of burley tobacco. Any person who does not receive a ballot may obtain one by calling, writing, or visiting the ASCS county office. All ballots

must be returned to the ASCS county office or be postmarked, no later than March 1, in order to be counted.

New York, Feb. 19.—How do the income tax deductions listed by Nicholas County residents in their federal returns compare with the deductions claimed by people with similar earnings in other areas?

These questions, of importance to people who are figuring out their tax reports, are answered in a study made by the Commerce Clearing House, a specialist in taxes and business law, of the basis of data supplied by the Treasury Department.
