Their revival will start Monday, July 15 at 7:30 p.m., with the Rev. August Peters as evangelist.

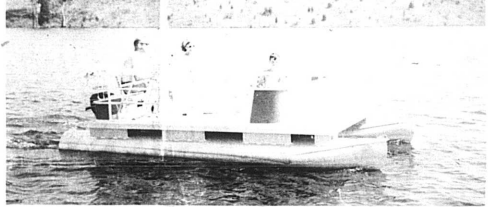

Buy a Buddy Poppy to help those veterans who are now disabled. The chairman, Mrs. Frank King, would like for the members to help with the sale.

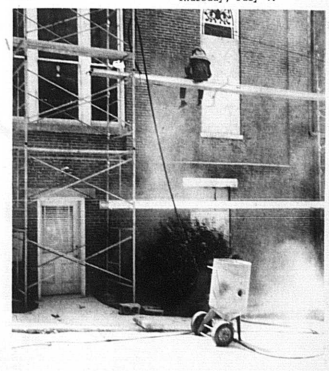
Woody Fryman Named To N. L. All-Star Staff

Woody Fryman of Fleming County, star of the Philadelphia Phillies has been named to the National League All-Star Staff. The eight-man pitching staff that boasts a combined record of 76 76 victories and only 29 defeats was named Saturday to represent the National League in the 1968 major league All-Star Game.

Manager Red Schoendienst of the world champion St. Louis Cardinals, who will direct the National League five right-handers and three left-handers to oppose the American League in the game at Houston the night of July 9.

The pitchers are right-handers Don Drysdale (10-0) of the Los Angeles Dodgers; Juan Marichal (14-3) of the San Francisco Giants; Bob Gibson (9-3) of St. Louis; Tom Seaver (6-3) of the New York Mets; and Ron Reed (8-3) of the Atlanta Braves and southpaw Steve Carlton (8-0) of St. Louis. Woody Fryman (10-7) of the Philadelphia Phillies, and Jerry Koosman (11-2) of the Mets.

Four of them—Gibson, Drysdale, Koosman and Fryman—have earned run averages of less than two runs per game. Reed's 2.85 earned run average is the highest.
