The Veterans of Foreign Wars took a 12-run, two-day record in two days to win the Nicholas County Babe Ruth League.

One record was the amount of runs scored against the Giants in one week. The Babe Ruth Dodgers have allowed 37 runs to cross the plate in two days, and to the misery, a total of 30 errors by Dodger players have set Saturday afternoon with the threat of rain. 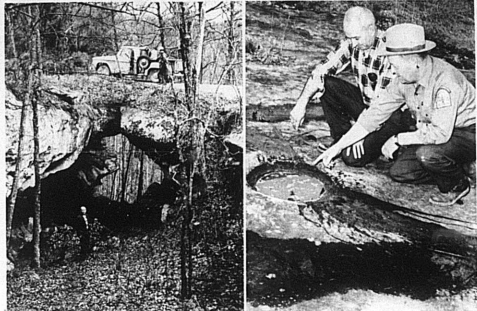
