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"Late Setting Out" Not Necessarily Fatal To Crop Weigh, Money Returns

Late setting out of tobacco in Kentucky doesn't necessarily mean a disappointing harvest, says W. D. Adkins, U.K. Agr. Experiment Station agronomist. In 1965 and 1966, he says, tobacco plants were set out as late as June 22 and performed satisfactorily from the weight and money returns.
