Helicopter Serves City Hospitals

The first private helicopter ambulance service in the United States is operating in Wayne, Michigan. A Detroit suburb, and has dramatically proved its life-saving capabilities.

The helicopter on its first mission involved the transfer of a critically burned patient from Wayne County General Hospital to the University of Michigan Burn Center at Ann Arbor.

Walt Gotowski, president of the Superior Ambulance Service anticipated that most trips would be 20 to 25 miles, but planned to offer the service within a 100-mile radius. However, another emergency sent the helicopter 200 miles away to Dayton, Ohio to transport a brain tumor patient.

"The doctor told me the patient could not have survived a move of this distance if it had not been for the helicopter," Gotowski said. "In addition to the smooth trip, we saved an hour to an hour and again in the fall as seasonal slaughter increases."

University of Kentucky agriculture economics department said recently in its bi-weekly business outlook letter.

Hilmer Hoving, economist, said the slightly higher price levels probably would come from some what lower pork supplies and smaller supplies of other red meats.

The report predicts a level of \$19 to \$21 a hundred through the first half of 1968, with a summer peak in past prices of \$20-\$23 a hundredweight.

It noted that hog producers expanded production from Nov. 1965 through Feb. 1967. During the summer and fall of 1967, farrowings declined to slightly below year-earlier levels and the 10 Corn Belt states indicate a slight reduction in farrowings through Feb. 1968.

Hog slaughter probably will be a little lower the first half of 1968 than the previous year, he noted.

Commercial hog slaughter in the first half of 1967 exceeded year earlier levels by 16 percent. This probably came from a 15 percent larger pig crop in June-November 1966, Hoving said. Larger farrows and girls averaged \$1950 a hundredweight during 1966 and early 1967 brought sharply lower prices. Farrows and girls averaged \$1700 a hundredweight in December-January 1966-67, he said.

Prices improved in the spring as slaughter declined, then fell again in the fall as seasonal slaughter increased.
