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Wagoner Issues Tips For Tobacco Growers

Farmers considering leaving strips of or fallow land in an alternate row arrangement with tobacco rows were reminded by Harvey Wagoner, chairman of the County ASC Committee, that the strips or fallow land must be as wide as, or wider than, four normal rows of tobacco to be deducted from the tobacco acreage.

"Normal rows" is described by Mr. Wagoner, as being at least 32 inches wide or the actual distance between the rows of tobacco in the field whichever is wider. Mr. Wagoner said that anyone planning to leave idle or fallow strips of ground in the tobacco field should contact the county ASC office before setting a tobacco.
