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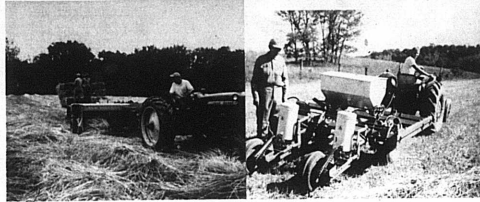

The traditional trophy will be awarded to the class with the greatest percentage of its members present, and special recognition will be paid to the oldest and youngest man and woman graduate present.

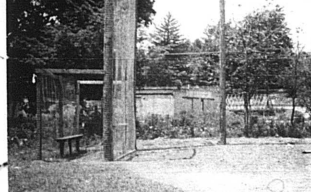

Local Share Of Highway Costs Are Estimated At \$86,000

Contributions are proportionately larger or smaller.

Transportation Secretary Alan Boyd reports that the cost of interstate highway system has climbed nearly 20 percent, or about \$9 billion, above the 1963 estimate. It is \$15.3 billion greater than the 1961 figure.

To start, the soaring costs are attributed to improved safety features that are being incorporated in the construction.

Back in 1958, when the project was started, it was believed that the work could be done for \$675,000 per mile. Today the cost is nearly double that amount.

As a result, points out Lowell K. Brewster, Federal Highway Administrator, the trust fund, which is on a pay-as-you-go basis, is not receiving enough revenue to maintain its schedule.

Consequently, it now appears that completion cannot be before 1975, instead of 1972.

With seven more years to go, Nicholas County car owners can expect to pay at least \$399,000 more into the fund, based upon the number of cars in the operating locality.
