Early Summer Care Of Pasture Raisers

Lexington, Ky.—Good management of early summer pastures pays dividends, says a Warren Thompson, U.K. Cooperative Extension Service forage specialist.
"From early May to late June, we usually have more high quality pasture than we can use, but from July to September, we often run short either in amount or quality," he says. He recommends several steps:
(1) Limit area livestock can graze at one time, preferably in a week or 10 days. This may require temporary fencing. Use surplus ungrazed areas for early cut, high quality hay or silage. Make these cuttings before seed heads form.
(2) Mow each pasture after each grazing-off. This will get rid of tall, mature plants refused by livestock, and will help destroy weeds.
(3) Topdress pastures with fertilizer after mowing or grazing. Use a current soil test as the guide. If the stand is less than 25 per cent legumes, include some nitrogen; if more than 25 per cent legumes, nitrogen is NOT needed, just phosphate and potash.

D-Room Addition Planned At Jenny Wiley State Park

Frankfort—The Kentucky Department of Parks has received financing approval from the State Development Administration, U.S. Department of Commerce, to construct a 12-room addition to the lodge at Jenny Wiley State Park at Frankfort. Park Commissioner Robert E. Gable announced that the new building will be built on the site of the old building, which was destroyed by fire in 1957.
Original plans were to build 10 surrounding cottages at the park, but the cost of new utility services made this project financially impractical, Gable said.
"To accommodate the 10 cottages, we would have to extend the water and sewage systems and build a new sewage treatment plant. The EDA and State Finance just wouldn't go that far," he explained.
"In addition to the present lodge facilities, we said," the Department of Finance will be requested to work with an architect on the design and programming of this new lodge facility, where the design is completed and approved, he said, construction bids will be requested.
The Economic Development Administration's grant is for 60 percent of the cost of the project. The State's share will be 40 percent.

Dying Plants May Be Due To Pythium Soft Rot

When tobacco plants die shortly after setting-out, pythium soft rot, a fungus, may be the cause.
Some years, says Dr. J.H. Smiley, U.K. Cooperative Extension Service tobacco specialist, 30 percent of the transplants may be killed. Buried leaves and stems of plants have a watery soft rot. Usually, the disease attacks after plants are about two weeks old in the field, and some measure can be taken to reduce severity of the infection, Dr. Smiley says.
(1) If plant mortality is 15 to 20 percent, or higher, disk the field and reseed, set new plants between old rows to avoid infected spots.
(2) Avoid over-seeding the plant bed, sow only two teaspoons of seed per 100 square yards of bed.
(3) Avoid fertilizer injury by using the recommended rate, 30 to 40 pounds per 100 square yards of bed.
(4) Plow under cover crop and manure from four to six weeks before setting-out time, so the peak decay and toxicity period will be gone before setting-out.
(5) Remove the plant bed cover about a week before plants are to be pulled. Soak the plant bed with water the day before pulling, using

Kimberling's blast came in the first inning off losing pitcher Milton Ploza. That was all the Vets needed as the Giants were able to get only one run. Dennis Hunt doubled to center and Wayne Fryman bloop single to right drove the final tally for the Giants. Vet pitcher Billy Hunter went all the way giving up only four hits.
While the Vets kept alive a four game winning streak the Dodgers have a two game losing streak. The Dairy Queens made a valiant effort but

Chigger Control

Like the woods in spring time? So does your old friend the devilish little chigger. He's just waiting for a chance to gang up on you.
You'll find this pest in lawns, parks, golf courses, meadows, thickets, woodlands, picnic areas and the like. They also like low, damp places.
They attach themselves and inject a fluid under your skin. This causes an intense itching that may last a week or more.
A pruritic, soapy bath will kill the chiggers that bit you and may get rid of others still waiting to attach themselves. Don't try to find them—they are so small they are barely visible.
