## Cadets March On Nicholas 33-0

The M. M. I. Cadets came to help Nicholas County close out their home season but didn't help much. The Cadets marched for 33 points and defeated the Bluejackets 33-0. The game was a big disappointment for the "Parent Night" crowd as well as for the team and coaches.

The Bluejackets held off the Cadets until 1:30 in the first quarter when Roy Williams raced 21 yards for the first score of the game.

The Bluejackets came alive in the second quarter when Mike Snapp took a Richard Descombes kick on the 45 and raced to the 31 of Nicholas. After 3 incomplete passes Nicholas had to punt. A ruffing the kicker penalty moved the ball to the Nicholas 44. When Nicholas punted another ruffing the kicker penalty moved the ball to the M. M. I. 41. After several gains and Miller-berg penalties Nicholas had the ball on the five yard line but mistakes fell again as Mike Snapp fumbled the "pigskin" on the four with 6:34 in the first half.

The Bluejackets did not fall easily tonight. I think they really had a harder hitting team than M. M. I.

The Coach gave special credit to Billy Robinson who averaged 4 yards per carry and gave Nicholas 3 of their first 6 runs.

The home season has ended, but the Bluejackets have a hard tunnel next week at Mt. Sterling when they close out the season with the Trojans.



## Cool Clear Water

Mr. and Mrs. Willie Lee Tabor, Locust Grove Road, inspect their recently installed livestock water fountain. A heating element will prevent freezing this winter. Providing clean water for livestock is a requirement for good grass-land management, and when approved by the Soil Conservation Service, such practices are eligible for cost-sharing under the Agricultural Conservation Program. Since leaving the steel mill in Ohio, Tabor has become a "Do It Yourself" farmer. He built a 15,000 gallon metal cistern, a silo, feeding racks and a milk room. He has a herd of about 35 dairy cows.

Two on-the-job training contracts in Kentucky were approved today by the Federal Government and employed persons were approved today by the State of Kentucky.

A total of \$113,115 has been allocated for these contracts under the Manpower Development and Training Act (MDTA).

## Gun Amnesty Period Nov. 2 Thru Dec. 1

Louisville, Ky.—Anyone having an unregistered machine gun, sawed-off shotgun, short barreled rifle or other gangster-type machine, or device such as a bomb, grenade or land mine, may turn in to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) without penalty from November 2 through December 1, 1968.

The Gun Control Act of 1968, signed into law last year, established a 30-day amnesty period for the registration of certain weapons and restricted devices. The registration requirement does not apply to ordinary rifles, shotguns, pistols and revolvers.

The Gun Control Act provides that information or evidence submitted in registering a weapon during this period cannot be used against the registrant in any criminal proceeding arising out of a prior or concurrent violation of the law. However, this would not prevent prosecution for furnishing false information.

Firearms and devices covered by the registration requirements must be registered by filling Form 4472, in duplicate, with Director, Alcohol & Tobacco Tax Division, Internal Revenue Service, Washington, D. C. 20224.

Anyone with a weapon to register should write or phone an office of the IRS and obtain Form 4467. Weapons and devices should not be brought to an office for the purpose of registration.

Former servicemen should register any automatic weapon pistols with absolute stocks, other National Firearms Act weapon they might have as a souvenir of their military days. Anyone with a bomb or grenade should make sure it is de-activated. The IRS can make arrangements to have the device inspected and de-activated.

The registration requirement for gangster-type weapons dates back to the National Firearms Act of 1934. There is no federal registration requirement for ordinary rifles, shotguns, pistols and revolvers, although certain controls on the sale of these weapons become effective December 16, 1968 as part of the new gun law.

Firearms which must be registered under the law include shotguns with barrels less than 18 inches long, rifles with barrels less than 16 inches long and altered rifles and shotguns with an overall length of less than 26 inches, such as shotguns or rifles cut down to pistol size or shape.

Other firearms covered by the registration requirements are fully automatic pistols, machine guns and pistols that fire more than one shot by a single function of the trigger and firearm mufflers or silencers. In addition, registration is required of all weapons or devices, except for conventional pistols or revolvers, which are capable of firing a shot and being concealed on a person and weapon form-

## Burley Sales Open Nov. 25 In State

Burley tobacco sales will open this year on Nov. 25.

A spokesman for the Burley Sales Committee said the market would operate week days through Dec. 18, except for Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 28. The sales will recess Dec. 18 and reopen Jan. 6.

Selling will be conducted at the daily rate of three and one-half hours.

## Civil Service Exams

## HHH, PEDEN, WATTS GET LOCAL VOTE; RICHARD NIXON, COOK SWEEP STATE



Although Hubert H. Humphrey carried Nicholas County, he lost the state and possibly the nation to Republican Richard M. Nixon in the Presidential election on Tuesday.

Katherine Peden won out over Marlow Cook in Nicholas County, but lost the Senatorial race throughout Kentucky as a whole.

On the other hand, John C. Watts won in Nicholas County and also recaptured his seat as representative from the Sixth District.

In the local school board election, where there was no opposition, Howard S. Livingston, William E. Hunter and Dean Auxier were re-elected easily with not much interest shown by the voters.

Kenneth Stevenson and Gene Snapp received one write-in vote each in Division 5 in which Dean Auxier was seeking re-election.

Kentucky was one of the first of the first states given a pollbook after the polls closed on Tuesday. If nine electoral votes are pledged to Nixon,
