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## Representative Points-Out City's Bond Sale Limitation

The city is only able to sell bonds for \$200,000 according to the Stein firm, and Boyce representative, Wesley Rutledge at Tuesday's call council meeting. There are presently bonds outstanding in the neighborhood of \$800,000, he stated.

He said the remainder, of the \$1,250,000 estimate to provide Blue Grass Kenting's expansion with the water it needs would have to come from Blue Grass itself in the form of some kind of security. One would be Blue Grass Kenting's purchase of a major portion of the bonds. Another could be for BCK to sign a contract for a certain amount over the 40 years life of the bonds, even if some unforeseen circumstances, BCK should be located elsewhere during the 40 years.

An engineer with the gas company stated that it appears, on the slim estimate of usage that are now available, that the winter service rate might be advantageous to both the city and BCK if Blue Grass were able to use almost as much gas in the summer as it does in the winter. This would involve BCK switching to gas air conditioning in summer, and switching to propane gas on peak days in the winter in order to reduce the winter load.

Wayne Shumate, president of Blue Grass Industries, said that BCK expansion is going to help over a 10 county area and that it seems government jobs should be available. He stated that BCK representative, Gregory Howard K. Hill, representative, said that only one government agency might consider such a loan. At such a loan, just gas alone would be limited to \$400,000 and would take a very long time to process. Also, that it is hard to predict what will happen to these government programs after the change in administrations in January.

Dr. Robert Sparks, councilman, questioned the feasibility of using the present city water plant only, but

adding 4 storage tanks and a big pump at the river. He stated that using Howard K. Hill's figures this answer would supply all the water needed since BCK would only use the water 5 days a week and the other two days could be used to draw water to storage.

Council passed two motions: (1) to make application for a government grant and to hire Howard K. Hill to make a thorough study of the entire project, (2) to obtain the services of Stein firm, and Boyce to be fiscal agent for the city.

BCK agreed to prepare a projection of gas and water usage as soon as possible for use in the report needed. All seemed to agree that firm facts and figures are needed before anything else can be decided about the project.

### Wrong County?

They must have the wrong county! They were enough in print in last Thursday's November 21 issue of the Courier-Journal in a story on page A-3, a small paragraph which, in prime candidate as a site in Kentucky is an area north of Carlisle, in Nicholas County.

A candidate for what? Why an atomic excavation project to create a cavern large enough to store more than 400 million cubic feet of gas under pressure?

It's all still on paper, and one of the two main considerations in site selection would seem to eliminate this area, but it may be a remote area, say 30 or so miles from a populated area, and not too near Columbia (Columbia Gas System Service Corp.) transmission lines, but not in so remote an area, all that.

It is suggested that the Atomic Energy Commission look elsewhere.
