ASC County Committee Named

Cong. Watts, Carter Oppose Senate Bill

Congressman John C. Watts, Nicholasville, and Jim Lee Carter, Tompkinsville, representing Kentucky's 9th and 5th districts, respectively, have informed the Blue Grass Automobile Club that they will oppose pending legislation which would permit larger and heavier trucks on the interstate highway system.

The Automobile club had urged the Congress to oppose S. 2636 which would permit truck traffic on the interstate highways which would be more than 100 feet long, with three trailers in each train and weighing more than 125,000 pounds.

In a resolution adopted earlier this year by the directors of the motorist organization, it was stated that if the truck bill were adopted it would bring about substantial increases in the cost of construction of highways and bridges and accelerated depreciation in the expected life of such facilities, accompanied by huge increases in maintenance costs.

The believe that truck combinations are already too large. Passenger car owners fear sharing the same highway with huge trucks. A recent survey indicates that millions of motorists regard over-size trucks as a major annoyance when on vacation trips.

The motorist's fear of the heavy truck is well-founded. Although heavy commercial vehicles represent only 7 percent of all vehicles, they are involved in 19 percent of highway fatalities. In collision with passenger cars, for every truck driver killed, thirty-eight others die. The AAA club stated that the bill would mean that I am in agreement with your thoughts in regard to S. 2636 and it will not be my purpose to support this bill.

Congressman Carter wrote that "I certainly mean to oppose it (S. 2636) in its present form. I realize the damage that can be caused by 8-1/2 foot wide trucks with as many as two trailers weighing 132,000 pounds. Already we are losing too many people on the highways. I can assure you that I am not careless in this regard."
