Farmers Use \$275 Million For Improvements In 1968

During the fiscal 1968, \$2,526 farm families availed themselves of Farmers Home Administration operating loans, according to the program administrator Orville L. Freeman said.
 Reporting on the progress of farm-credit operating credits, Mr. Freeman said that \$775 million was advanced during the 12 months ending June 30 for such expenses as new machinery and equipment, livestock, fertilizer, feed, seed, pasture improvement, and fencing.
 Operating loan funds also were used to refinance debts, pay family living expenses, and develop forestry production on idle farm land.
 "This type of credit," Mr. Freeman said, "has enabled many small farm operators to stay on the land."
 As the fiscal year ended, farm families that included nearly 440,000 people were benefiting from the program which serves family farmers who can find no other source of necessary operating loan credit, the Secretary continued.

The Jets scored again in the 3rd quarter when Soper kicked a Richmond player in the Richmond end zone for a safety. This concluded the scoring. Richmond had a touchdown called back in the 3rd quarter on a penalty. Richmond also threatened again late in the game connecting on a long pass play, but Snapp and Dennis Berry caught the receiver short of the goal line, and the Blue Jet defense held.

The Blue Jet coaching staff said the team played an outstanding game, with all the boys performing well. Singled out for offensive honors was Snapp, who, in addition to his two scores, had another touchdown called back on a penalty and returned a kick-off for 65 yards. Defensive standouts were Soper, Bilbr, Kenneth Smost and Norvell Garrett.

General U.S. Economy Expected To Grow In 1968-69, U.K. Says

LEXINGTON, Ky.—The nation's general economy is expected to grow the rest of 1968 and during 1969, but at a much slower pace than during the first half of 1968.
 That's one statement in the bi-weekly outlook letter of the U. S. Cooperative Extension Service's agricultural economics department this week.
 Consumer income will rise more slowly during fiscal 1968-1969 (July 1-June 30), consumer spending will rise faster than income, and personal savings will be lower, says Wilmer Browning, economist.
 Unemployment is expected to rise about 43 percent of the labor force, but "unusually" pressures will not be as heavy in this fiscal year, says the report, because of the tax increase and government spending reductions. Credit will likely be eased further since fiscal policy measures have been initiated to control inflation.
 Demand for farm products will expand, but less rapidly than last year. Farmers will likely receive slightly higher prices for livestock and products, but crop prices will average lower this fiscal year.
 "Realized" net farm income in the U.S. is estimated at about \$14.75 billion, compared to \$14.3 billion in 1967, but farm production expenses are expected to jump about \$1.1 billion.
 Farm income in Kentucky is expected to decline slightly for 1968-69 because of higher production costs and lower prices for some major grain crops and somewhat lower hog prices. Production expenses are expected to increase at about the same rate as last year.
 Some crop information by category:
 WHEAT: Kentucky's estimated production is about 385.6 million pounds (for 1968) on 157,000 acres. For an average yield of 2,475 pounds. This is up 90 pounds an acre from last year, and total production is estimated to be up 4 percent. Support price average for the 1968-1969 season is 63.5 cents a pound, compared to 61.8 cents a pound for last year.
 Domestic use of barley was estimated at 143 million pounds, the same as for last year. Exports are expected to decline some this year. Total "disappearance" (all channels of use) is expected this year to be about 390 million pounds, 10 million lower than the previous year.
 Prices for 1968-1969 should average the same to slightly higher because of strong demand and higher support prices.
 DARK TOBACCO: Production of dark tobacco in Types 22 and 231 one-sucker and Green River tobacco is expected to rise from 10 to 13 percent from last year depending on the type. Prices for dark-fired tobacco, the air-cured tobacco likely will average lower this year because of higher production costs.
 FEED GRAINS: Total feed grain supply will increase by more than 220 million bushels.



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
