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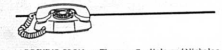

The Blue Jets defense really started hitting and caused the All-Stars to fumble on their own 30. After six plays Darrell Snapp scored on a 5 yard pass. The extra point extra was good. On the kickoff, Bill Allison, who put his 22 punts down for extra points on a Fleming County fumble on the All-Star 50. The All-Star defense held and Fleming County took over the ball on their own 20 at the 12:57 mark. The Blue Jets defense held and the All-Stars were forced to punt. The Blue Jets took over on the 11 yard line and Fleming County scored on a 10 yard pass but missed the extra point, to make the final score, Fleming County 15, Blue Jets 12. VIC KING, 140 PUNTER
"King gives you 140 percent." Coach Charlie Bradshaw said after his Wildcat loss to LSU Saturday night in Hanon Rouge, Louisiana. Bradshaw thought Kentucky had played well enough to win and Vic King had played outstandingly. The Junior split-end from Kingston, Tennessee, caught five passes against LSU for 78 yards. The week before he recovered a fumble in the end zone for a touchdown as the Wildcats upset Oregon State.

Vic insists he came to Kentucky from the volunteer state because "I liked the people up here," but he has close ties to the Commonwealth. King has relatives in Harlan, Kentucky, and has spent some of his summers working in the eastern Kentucky town. Vic came to the Wildcats with very impressive high school credentials and became an outstanding receiver with the freshmen in 1966. Realizing the Wildcats were deep in receivers last season, King went to Coach Bradshaw and requested he be permitted to try out as a punter. Bradshaw moved King back to end. He has been rolling ever since.

Vic King has good size and good hands for a receiver. He is 6'2 and weighs 180 pounds. He has shown himself to be especially effective in the clutch. Vic not only has the tools to be a fine player but as his coach says, "King gives you 140 percent."

Families Usually Safest

When Planning For Fires

"Experience shows that a family which has planned ahead for a fire emergency usually is able to make a safe escape when fire actually strikes." A National Fire Protection Association report indicates the majority of lives lost in home fires each year was needlessly lost because of failure to pre-plan and rehearse. Pre-planning is essential to protect the family. For fire escape so rapidly there is no time then to figure out what to do. Make sure everyone, including the children, knows exactly what to do. Then, hold family fire drills regularly, so everyone in the family will react almost automatically to a fire emergency.

1. Carefully figure out at least two means to the outside from every room in the house, especially bedrooms. Always use the back of stairways or hall by fire.
2. Remember that closed bedroom doors will hold back flame and smoke, allow extra time for escape, particularly in sleeping fires.
3. For upper-floor escape, use any available porch and garage roofs, ladders, or trees as ways down to safety. Be sure exit windows work easily, and especially that they are low and large enough to get through.
4. Pick an outside assembly point where the family will meet, and be sure everyone understands the rule: "Once out-stay out."
5. Know how to call your fire department, from an outside or neighbor's phone, and do this as quickly as the house is clear of people.

Blue Ribbon Tobacco Festival To Be Held In Cynthiana Oct. 26

The Cynthiana Chamber of Commerce and the Tobacco Board of Trade will hold their second annual Blue Ribbon Tobacco Festival on Saturday, Oct. 26, starting at 10 a.m. Between 7,000 to 8,000 people are expected to attend. Cash prizes will be awarded on samples of three bundles (hand), on four categories which are: Trash, Logs, Bright Leaf and Red Leaf.

Prizes place on all grades will be \$7, second \$5, and third \$3. Growers will compete only against other growers from the same county. There will be nine different tobacco shows for the growers from Bourbon, Bracken, Grant, Hartwood, Nicholas, Owen, Pendleton, Robertson, and Scott counties.
