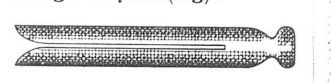

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Parenthood
This time of the year we start to be more plagued with pest-infesting numbers of various kinds of pests. An abundance of information concerning their control can be found at your County Extension Office. One special pest during this season is mites in the lawn. The way to control mites is to control the white grubs on which the mites feed. Several treatments will control white grubs and you have a choice as to when to treat your lawn. You may want to treat your lawn in April if you find an average of three or more grubs per square foot sample of lawn. If mites are causing damage at this time, and if your lawn was damaged in winter last year, you may need to treat them first. Control is more difficult to carry out on warm soil grubs are further developed and are harder to kill. Right in the middle of the season, such as April, the white grubs are still in the soil and are not yet in the soil. A light rain of water will bring them to the surface. Children and pets in the treated lawn will be able to play in the lawn. The treatment will kill the grubs and the mites. The mites will be able to play in the lawn.

ETV Special
A University of Kentucky dental student was interviewed recently for a program on dental disease to be telecast by the National Educational Television network.
The interview show, called "An Hour of Prevention," reports some unusual community programs designed to improve the level of dental health, especially among the program's ETV network.
The program, which aired on April 16, at 9 p.m., and again the following Tuesday, April 22, at 8 p.m., featured a second-year UK dental student from Somerset, reports in an interview with the program's executive producer, Duane Proffit, that in some communities he has visited, dental disease continues to take nearly all of one's teeth by the age of 25.
Proffit says that to fight the problem, "Modern dentistry, such as the one at UK, are developing what might be called preventive dentistry on the community level." The TV program reports a number of dental centers, including one in Louisville, which "used a program of dental care introduced as an experiment in providing professional dental services to a large number of people and the 'wheel' is a circular arrangement of dental chairs which is rotated by only two dentists, aided by a large number of assistants. The work is coordinated by personnel who stand in the middle of the circle, using a code to direct the activities of the assistants.
