### That Time Again

FRANKFORT—On Sunday, April 27, Kentucky and the rest of the Nation will return to daylight saving time for six months.

It is recommended you turn your watches and clocks forward one hour before setting for the night on Saturday, April 26. That way, you will be on time—proper, daylight time—upon arising Sunday morning.

Kentucky is divided into two time zones. The eastern and central sections are in the Eastern Zone, the western section in the Central Zone. The dividing line runs southeast from the western boundary of Meade County. On Eastern Daylight Time will be all counties east of and including Meade, Harlan, Letcher, Taylor, Casey, Putnam and Mingo. On Central Daylight Time will be all counties west of and including Breckinridge, Grayson, Hart, Green, Adair, Russell and Wayne.

### 'Working Budget Is Fine... If You Can Keep It Going'

Mayor William Power's comment following an approximately two-hour discussion of the need for a working budget and a change in the bookkeeping system was, "I think it is a wonderful system... the working budget is fine. If you can keep it all going."

The recommendations of the Finance Committee composed of 12 paraprofessionals was not adopted. But Mayor Power promised Council to call another meeting in a few days.

One thing which promoted the work of the Budget Committee composed of Charles Wilson, chairman, Budget Committee; Dr. Robert Sparks, chairman, Finance Committee; Jack Morrison and Clifton Waugh, was a letter under the date of Feb. 11, 1969 from Yeager, Ford & Warren, Lexington, Certified Public Accountants to the City of Carlisle and Mayor Power.

After recently completed audit of the City of Carlisle was performed to accept the budget for the year ending December 31, 1968. During the course of our examination several matters came to our attention which we believe warrant your consideration, although the matters were not properly includable in the report of audit.

Your present accounting system is a cash receipts and disbursements accounting system. This has been adequate in previous years. However, during recent years the City has accumulated many new fixed assets such as new fire truck, and is contemplating extensive additions to the gas and water plants. This has caused a need for more long-term and short-term borrowings. Neither of these very important items are being adequately disclosed in your cash receipts and cash disbursements system. Therefore, we

recommend that the City of Carlisle change to a modified accrual accounting system. This will be a big problem because Ann Harper is currently maintaining most of the necessary records. It will require an appraisal of the gas and water plants, and a listing and valuation of all other city owned assets such as buildings, trucks and office furniture. Howard K. Bell and your insurance agent should be able to help in this area. We believe the accrual basis balance sheet and statement of income and expenditures will be more meaningful both to the reader and to the City officials.

Your present system of keeping gas and water revenue on a cash receipts system has a number of weaknesses which could be utilized by employees for personal gain if they were so inclined. You may not be fortunate enough to have a dedicated person such as Ann Harper. In the position of City Clerk for a midwestern period of time.

Budget Finance Committee Recommendations

Councilman Charles Wilson, chairman of the Budget Committee explained his committee's recommendations, quoting again from his prepared report.

"Tonight we want to discuss a budget for Carlisle's future growth and management, and total utilization of all funds. In our findings as we have met from time to time and as we discuss, we have no criticism of any kind as we bring things up for discussion or talk about issues.

"We are all servants of our fair City and we want the best for her as we can."

"Carlisle's business was over \$600,000 last year. This alone, passed on to the citizens, is a good thing."

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### Bass Size Regulation Effective May 4

Frankfort, April 15.—A regulation setting the minimum size limit for bluegill bass taken from Kentucky waters to 10 inches, will become effective on May 4, 1969, according to the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

The new regulation was approved by the Fish and Wildlife Resources Commission at a meeting held at Frankfort on March 27.

"Another regulation, permitting the training net to be kept during which no more than 100 fish are to be taken in any manner, will become effective on May 4, according to the Legislative Research Commission. All regulations passed by the Department must be recorded in the Kentucky Register and the effective date is set by that agency."

The law which has been reported approved a previous one that set a 12-inch minimum size limit for bass and impoundments and a 10-inch size limit for bass from streams.

All waters of the state are now under the minimum limit of 10 inches for bluegill bass.

Previous regulations had prevented the training net from being used during a period except in fish trials and in waters where the net was used to determine the size of fish. Whether or not in a trial, but the net may not be used.
