Hunting Season Begins Saturday

Kentucky's 1969-70 hunting season gets underway at daylight Saturday, August 16, with the opening of the first day required season. Fish and Wildlife sources expect another good season, based on the basis of the "best season" in a decade, which was experienced last year with a high population of quail.

The bag limit is at six per day, they tell us, with a maximum of 12 in possession. The two or more days of hunting, says a wild horse, carried by the horse, required.
