Since there has been a considerable number of requests for advertisement to be treated as news articles recently, the Mercury has decided that an explanation of its policy in this regard is needed.

Any article which is basically concerned with a business—its location, new office hours or a change in office hours, because of a holiday or the moving of an office to a new location, or an announcement of a new or promotional venture—is an advertisement. It is not a news article.

The Mercury will, as a public service, not charge for such material which is not related to a business—for example, non-profit organizations, activities relative to charitable events, etc. We will reserve the right to decide the half-line ones. For instance, the change of hours of the Nicholas County Health Department will be considered news and does not charge for the reports except through a small property tax assessment.

The Mercury does not charge for certain articles placed on the front page. No advertisement will be used on the front page at any price, and

Delinquent Tax List Should Be Published By Fourth Class Cities

The Carlisle Mercury, a member of the Kentucky Press Association, thru its publisher, asked the Association's Board of Directors to seek an opinion concerning the publication of delinquent tax statements, due to a problem which arose some months ago. The question and response by Attorney General John B. Breckinridge, follows:

"I have been asked by my Board of Directors to ask you for an opinion on Sections 92.530 and 134.430 in response to your question, we will cite the following statute pertinent to the various classes of cities which require the publication of delinquent tax statements pursuant to Chapter 234, KRS First class cities—KRS 92.410 (second class cities—KRS 92.420) (third class cities—KRS 92.430) (fourth class cities—KRS 92.440) (fifth and sixth class cities—KRS 92.450. All of the above referred to statute, except the one relating to fifth and sixth class cities, require the notice of sale of property for delinquent taxes to be advertised pursuant to Chapter 234, KRS, which specifically means KRS 234.10 (1) (c). This statute requires the advertisement to be published once a week for three successive weeks, KRS 92.450, relating to fifth and sixth class cities, does not specifically require the publication of delinquent tax notices, however, it does provide that tax liens may be enforced by a summary sale of the property under such regulations as the city legislative body prescribes by ordinance.

IRS Send Card Explaining New 1040

Each of the 18 million taxpayers in the United States who filed the new discontinued card 1040-A Form last year will receive a postcard this week explaining the change to the new, consolidated 1040 Form, the Internal Revenue Service announced today.

This year all taxpayers will receive a larger, complete tax package that includes the one-page basic 1040 and additional pages or schedules, which may or may not be used according to the taxpayer's needs. It will be mailed to the taxpayer's home by Jan. 15, 1970. Past 1040-A users will find that except for a few letters, the new 1040 is the same as the old 1040-A. The IRS will ask for the name information on the old card form and that they will probably not need to fill out more than
