### New Advances May Cut Local Heart Toll

NEW YORK—A closer look at the heart disease situation in Nicholas County is in order just now because next month will be Heart Disease Month.

The latest government figures, detailing the 33 principal causes of death in each community, show that heart disease continues to rank first in the local area.

Nationally, it represents the greatest threat to human life, more so than cancer, accidents, pneumonia and all other diseases combined.

The report, released by the U. S. Public Health Service, reveals that fully 59.1 percent of all deaths in all Nicholas County are due to some form of heart disease. This includes all ailments of the cardiovascular system.

Nationally, by way of comparison, the disease accounts for 24.4 percent of the total mortality. The average is 33.7 percent in the East South Central States and 55.8 percent in the local area.

What is baffling to medical researchers is the fact that heart disease is considerably greater in some sections than it is in others. Also next month will be Heart Disease Month.

The Jackets were down six points at the end of the first quarter and 22-15 halfway through the second.

Nicholas went to work early in the third quarter, burning out four for straight points cutting the lead to 22-19 and a 3-point lead. Steve Kimbrough collected fouls number 3 and 4 in the quarters. Two free throws by Jerry Pickrell and high point man Doug Bowling brought the lead back to six, 33-26. With 2:22 Rodney Hutton hit the hoop and again the lead was four, a Billy House foul and Hutton rebound shot, the score was 32-30 with 1:20 left in the quarter. Ball with time to go and up ahead Jerry Pickrell made the ball and the Panthers held a four point lead 34-30 with five minutes to go to play.
