Joe Crouch To Head Easter Seal Campaign

Joe Crouch of Carlisle has been named chairman of the 1969 Easter Seal Campaign for Nicholas County, according to Coach Frank Camp, assistant athletic director at the University of Louisville state campaign chairman. Mr. Crouch has been Nicholas County Chairman since 1967. The annual appeal will begin March 1 and continue through Easter Sunday. Contributions to the campaign will be by the Kentucky Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults to provide care and treatment for physically handicapped children throughout the state. Easter Seal centers operated by the Kentucky Easter Seal Society include: Cardinal Hill Convalescent Hospital and Cardinal Hill Nursery School in Lexington; the West Kentucky Center for Handicapped Children, Paducah; Northern Kentucky Treatment Center and Opportunity School in Covington; the Hearing and Speech Center, Louisa; and Camp Kywee, Carrollton. The statewide program of the Kentucky Society includes physical and occupational therapy, medical care and hospitalization, special schooling, residential camping, transportation and hearing and speech services. The society serves a children crippled by many causes.

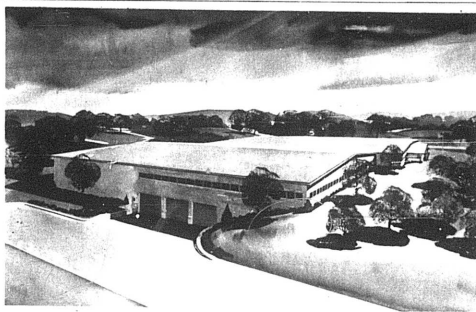

South Central Tel Expansion Continues At Vigorous Rate

Expansion of telephone facilities here and throughout Kentucky by South Central Bell continued at a vigorous rate during 1968, according to a joint year-end progress report by the firm's local and state officials.

C. A. Harris, the utility's local manager, said that approximately 4.7 per cent more telephones were in service here at the end of the year than on December 31, 1967. The increase raised the total in use in Nicholas County at the beginning of this year to 20,028.

C. Hunter Green, vice president of the telephone company's Kentucky operations, Louisville, reported that during the same period the number of telephones in South Central Bell's statewide system increased 3.5 per cent. The addition of 40,263 telephones during the year was the second largest in the company's history.
