

New Tax Surcharge Calculations Trip Up Many Tax Payers Here

Louisville, Ky. Many local taxpayers are making mistakes in computing the new tax surcharge on their 1968 Federal income tax returns, Robert J. Darst, District Director of Internal Revenue for Kentucky said today.

Some taxpayers are forgetting to add the surcharge to their regular tax while others are failing to deduct the surcharge from their regular tax, Darst said. If the taxpayer reports a refund, it will be delayed until the mistake is corrected.

Mr. Darst suggested that taxpayers and their accountants take time to check the instructions that come with the tax forms. The tax surcharge is explained

In both the 1968 and 1969A instructions. Mr. Darst said the tax surcharge on 1968 income amounts to 7 1/2 percent, or 50% of the taxpayer's regular tax. For example, if a person's tax was \$1,000 before the surcharge, it would be \$1,075 with the surcharge taken into account.

Although the surcharge is generally described as a 10 percent tax, it did not become effective until April 1, 1968. Mr. Darst said, to simplify calculation for taxpayers, Congress specified that taxpayers pay 7 1/2 percent of the tax on all of their 1968 income, rather than 10 percent of the tax on income earned after April 1, 1968.

SC Tel Expansion

To add the facilities needed to expand telephone service here, and in Kentucky during 1968 required the expenditure of approximately \$38,000,000, Mr. Green said.

Highlighting the telephone company's service expansion elsewhere in the Commonwealth was the conversion of the Bowling Green exchange to Direct Distance Dialing at a cost of \$1,300,000. The installation of an emergency power supply system atop the Cheanut Street building in Louisville at \$400,000; the statewide expansion of long distance facilities at \$4,000,000.

The first transmission facilities furnished to the TV network in Kentucky were turned over to the station August 17. Governor Louis B.
