Nicholas County Retail Merchants Had Good Year -- Figures Show

(Special to the Mercury) — Sixty-two Nicholas County's retail merchants reported to be a good year for the first figures.

The same basic families as a whole were in comparatively good financial shape and spent more on clothing, expenditures for goods and services in a new high.

The details are found in the annual survey made by the Standard Retail and Wholesale Merchants Association.
