## Council To Annex Land For Housing Project

City Council voted Monday night to proceed with the annexation of 1,006 acres of land for the housing project at the request of W.R. Hunt Jr., representing the Nicholas County Housing Commission. The property is located between Spangone Hill and Highway 52.

Council also voted to advertise for bids to be opened June 16 at 1:30 p.m. in a new police cruiser since the present one was severely damaged in an on-duty accident Sunday morning at 8 a.m. Policeman Sam Finch was driving toward the hospital chasing a speeder when a car pulled onto the highway from Bryant's Grocery into the path of Finch's cruiser. Also to be considered are the possibilities of buying a used state patrol car or leasing a cruiser.

A report was made regarding the recent burglary at the City Hall. A new lock has been put on the door and a new combination has been assigned to the safe. City Clerk Ann Harper is the only person who is to know the new combination which has been locked in a box at a bank. Mrs. Harper stated that deposits are being made by frequency as necessary to eliminate the possibility of having an excess of money in the city building. She also stated that Gayle Vandalingham, Mike Jones and she had voluntarily taken the polygraph test in Frankfort. One person has refused to do so, that fact, he was not identified.

Council also voted to divide the city months, which are now in the First National Bank, an equally as possible between the two local banks beginning July.

Councilman Charita Wilson was given permission to invite representatives from the Department of Finance in Frankfort to come to a Council meeting and explain the newly passed budget system to Council. It was suggested that a good date might be June 16 when Council will meet again to open the cruiser bids. Mrs. Harper said that Yeager, Ford and Warren representatives would arrive sometime next week to explain the new accrual accounting system to her.

Parking will no longer be permitted on both sides of Mulberry between Locust and Broadway because the street is so narrow. Cars will be permitted to park on the North side only.

Building permits were granted to Mrs. Clay Dayton to repair and replace a porch on E. Main Street and to build and Vice Builders to construct a building at 101 S. Broadway behind the present building.

Ronnie Lawson appeared before Council requesting that gravel be put on Sharon Way and a ditch be faced.

John Allison suggested that a postal fall was badly needed on Sharon Way at Second Street. The Street Committee was assigned to check into the problems and report back to Council at the next meeting.

Allison also mentioned the possibility of hiring patrol women for certain intersections when school starts. Council agreed to discuss this further and to buy school caution lights before school starts for Broadway and North and Dorsey Ave. intersections.

Council also agreed to buy a new caution light for Douglas Court. Chief Hartwiese was instructed to investigate the tires and cones with State officials regarding "Stop, Turn Right on Red" signs for the three stop lights on Main Street. Brooks Hanson will instruct Council's meeting after Elizabeth Gayle Vandalingham was hired to clean the City building after Elizabeth Gayle's resignation.

Aid of \$140.00 from Ballitt Ford to install 10 storm windows at the present Plant was accepted by Council provided the work can be accomplished within 10 days.

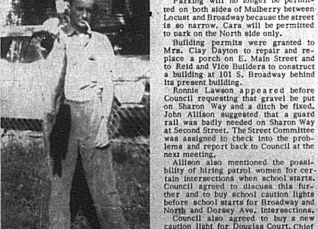
## Weed Control in Burley Field Important to Crop Yields

Weeds are big thieves of burley crop quality and yield, says Ira Massey, UK Cooperative Extension Service tobacco specialist.

"Grassy or broadleaf weeds competing with tobacco plants, will always win," he points out. "The weeds are easier and get more sun, moisture and nutrients. This reduces crop yield and quality."

Massey has the following control methods: Use the old standby of high cultivation between rows. Use broad surface of the ground to kill weeds.
