Baugus Receives Operators Certificate

Clarence H. Baugus has been employed by the City of Carlisle for the past five years as Sewage Treatment Plant operator. Mr. Baugus received a certificate on March 7, 1969 reading, "Be it known that Clarence H. Baugus having qualified as required by act of General Assembly and regulations of the State Department of Health is duly certified and is hereby authorized to practice as a Sewage Treatment Plant Operator Class II. Signed by Russell E. Trague, M. D., Commissioner of Health." Operators are required to pass tests each year. Mr. Baugus helped build the disposal plant and started working there at its completion in 1963.

Wildlife Week March 16-22 Sounds Habitat Alarm In Nicholas County

The Nicholas County Fish and Game Club is joining in a nationwide effort to "Provide Habitat—Places Where Wildlife Live." This theme for the 1969 National Wildlife Week observance March 16-22, will draw attention to the growing urgency to protect and provide natural areas that support wildlife.

Oliver Wraith, club president, working on the local Wildlife Week effort, said "We cannot keep using up our open spaces, woodlots, and water areas for subdivisions, highways, and shopping centers without losing wildlife, which need natural areas to survive. Of course, we must develop our land and water resources, but in ways that do not destroy habitats."

Conservation officials are alarmed by the heavy toll of habitat areas from increased urban and suburban sprawl. The Nation's water areas may be the most imperiled. It has been estimated that more than 70 million acres of wetlands and waterways over half of the country's total acreage have been lost through draining, dredging, filling, and pollution. Reputational damage to the Nation's waterways is also being done.

Wildlife Week 1969 will encourage people to protect wetlands, woodlots, and forest habitat areas. The Week is sponsored by the National Wildlife Federation, headquartered in Washington, D. C., and the state affiliate, the Nicholas County Wildlife Federation. The annual conservation drive gains support from state, county, town, and individual organizations and individuals interested in the wise use of natural resources.

Council To Implement BGK Phase 1 Water Facilities

At a call meeting Tuesday night in Columbus, Mo. to implement Phase I of the capital program on providing additional water to 11 local cities. A meeting provided financing can be obtained by selling municipal bonds.

Representatives from 104 and Howard K. Hunt Engineering met with Council. They agreed to spend the estimated \$200,000 for Phase I, which would include a new water pump, two storage tanks, and about 5 1/2 miles of 12 inch pipe. Phase II, which is estimated to cost in the neighborhood of \$800,000, would have to be subdivided in large part by local towns. The city could not financially afford the financing of this Phase.

If the City is successful in selling the bonds to pay for Phase I, it will be restricted to 280,000 gallons of water per day even after it is ready for full production. A building permit was granted for the Damper to add a room and porch onto the house on North Street.
