Progress Locally

In Control Of Cancer

NEW YORK, N.Y.—Increase April has been designated "Cancer Control Month," special interest centers on the progress being made in Nicholas County in coping with the disease.

Figures released by the government reveal the number of cancer cases in the local area, as compared with the number recorded in other communities.

The data, compiled by the U. S. Public Health Service, sheds light on the entire picture—on lung cancer as well as its other forms.

It shows, among residents of Nicholas County, an overall cancer mortality that is somewhat lower than in most sections of the country.

The latest annual figures list 6 such deaths locally, excluding those of non-residents.

It amounted to a rate of 102 cancer deaths per 100,000 population. The national rate, by way of comparison, was 124 per 100,000. In the State of Kentucky it was 140.

United Methodist Church Lay Revival Begins Sunday

The laymen of the United Methodist Church, Carlsle, are sponsoring a lay revival beginning at 7:30 p.m. on Friday.

The report indicates that lung cancer has become the leading cause of cancer death among males, with a rate that is 14 times greater than it was 15 years ago.

Among women also, it is beginning to show a steady rise although it is still far below the male rate.

Nationally, according to the Public Health Service, lung cancer accounted for 18 percent of all cancer deaths in the year.

The American Cancer Society depicts the huge loss of life due to lung cancer, which it terms "a largely preventable disease since most of it is caused by cigarette smoking." The cure rate is less than 10 percent.

On the other hand, improved drugs plus new techniques have enabled doctors to substantially increase the survival rate in other types of cancer. Currently one patient in three living, cured, they say, but the proportion could be one out of two if people would see a physician immediately when symptoms appear.

School Registration Dates Set In April

All school children who will enter school in Nicholas County for the first time in the first grade at the beginning of the 1969-70 school term which will begin in August, will register on any of the following dates; April 1, 2, 3, or 4.

It is of utmost importance that the children be registered because State regulations require that children be registered on the basis of the number of children enrolled. If a child is not registered, he may not receive books. Each parent is urged to bring the child's birth certificate at the time of registration.
