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**Prof. Bruce H. Westley Becomes UK Chairman Of Journalism Dept.**

"The University of Kentucky Department of Journalism is of high standing, enjoys a good reputation and has a number of senior faculty members who know what they are doing and do it well."

These observations by Prof. Bruce H. Westley, who has a great deal to do with his move to Kentucky. The veteran newsman-educator arrived on the UK campus in January as chairman of the Journalism department in the UK School of Communications.

Prof. Westley has done extensive research in communications, both at Wisconsin and at other schools, including the University of Michigan. In 1969 he supervised a research program in the towns of Cayasqui and Quito, Ecuador, for the University of Minnesota. He had incurred in graduate in 1965 for the U. S. Department

of State.

"UK very wisely recognizes the importance of the relatively new academic field of communications," says Prof. Westley.

"We are in a real communications crisis these days — brought about through such situations as urban versus rural, black versus white and the young versus the old. This is not merely imagination. It's really happening."

He believes the basic unity of communications processes someday may make a difference in getting these processes started again.

"Because these frightening new barriers have grown up, we pursue the academic of communications—especially at the graduate level—because it is what we are interested in, not to serve the world although at the same time we see that the world needs better communications."

**Ky. Had 30 Million Visitors**

Kentucky had 30 million visitors in 1968 and they spent \$35 million during their stay.

James Hoat, state Commissioner of Public Information, at the Kentucky Tourism Conference on Feb. 18 in Louisville, standing in for Governor Louie B. Nunn, Hoat addressed a group of about 200 tourism and industry leaders. He noted that tourism is already the sixth largest industry, producing 26,000 jobs.

"The million more visitors came to Kentucky in 1968 than in the previous year and the \$45 million they spend is up above the 1967 figure."

Hoat also announced for the 20th anniversary of the setting of Harrodsburg. Hoat said that a minimum of 10 million visitors could be charged soon. He said that normally he expects to be expected to this would be 6.5 million more attracted by the bi-centennial celebration.

Also speaking to the conference group was Elliot L. Lewis, who reported on his firm's six-month study of the anniversary observance. Lewis is president of Leisure Systems, Inc. Lewis proposed that the state plan a six-month celebration from April to September of 1974. He predicted that as many as 11 million tourists might spend one night or more during the anniversary year compared to the 4-million-a-year current figure for overnight out-of-state guests.

Becker, Jr., American Airlines; David Blackburn, Great Southwest Corporation, Arlington, Texas; Robert Cornwell, Corpus Christi and Fort Worth Bureau, Corpus Christi.
