853 Families Get Food During March

The Kentucky Department of Agriculture distributed food to 853 families in Nicholas County during March, according to a U. S. Department of Agriculture report. USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service said that 129,855 pounds in 52 counties took part in its food stamp program and received 1,007,110 in bonus coupons. The CMA's family food distribution program aided 76,991 persons in 66 counties.

Grand Jury Report For May Term Given

We, the Grand Jury duly empaneled for this term of the Nicholas Circuit Court, do hereby make our final report as follows: We have made careful investigation into all violations of the penal laws of this state in this jurisdiction of which we have any knowledge or have received information, and have returned indictments in all cases in which the evidence in our opinion justified trial by petit jury. We have been in session two days, and have returned six indictments.

The Grand Jury discussed several matters of general interest and made the following recommendations: It is recommended that the Nicholas County Fiscal Court consider classifying a separate entrance into the jail, preferably on the Elm Street side, on that premises might be taken into the jail without having to go through the kitchen, front hall or any other living quarters of the jail. It is recommended that the State High Department initiate action against the operators of a junk yard located at the former Myers Station School.
