

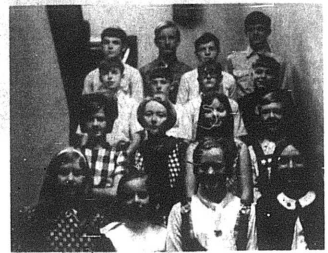

Printed Report Submitted Concerning School District

A State Department of Education survey team has submitted a printed report to Superintendent D.P. Parley concerning the educational facilities of the Nicholas County School District. The study was made in July of this year.

Four recommendations were listed:

1. A building to house all Nicholas County pupils of grades 1-5 should be constructed on the site adjacent to the Nicholas County High School.
2. A building should be constructed on a portion of the site adjacent to the Nicholas County High School to house a middle school program for all Nicholas County pupils of grades 6-8. The statement in recommendation #1 as to organization and facilities shall apply to this proposed middle school.
3. A two-bay garage should be constructed in the vicinity of Carlisle to service the Nicholas County School bus fleet.
4. The access road leading to the high school should be improved.

Hog Cholera Check Made At Bridge

Four trucks moving livestock across the Kentucky-Ohio state line at the Mayville-Aberdeen bridge are being stopped by federal, state and local authorities to check for hog cholera. Livestock intended for stockyards was not being halted. The stoppage on farm livestock resulted from a recent epidemic.

Officials handling the investigation on the Kentucky side are James Galbraith, Carlisle, federal agent in charge of checking movement of livestock across state lines; Paul Hillman, Frankfort, with the division of livestock for the Kentucky Meat Transportation Commission; and four area representatives of KMC, Kent, Thelma Moore, Mason County, Bruce Insko and Robert Case, Robertson County, and Dale Cooper, Breckinridge County.

Posthumous Medal Awarded Officer

Lt. Harold Blacorn (Pinky) Durham Jr., son of the late Harold B. Durham and grandson of the late Mrs. Susan Durham of Carlisle, Friday was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor posthumously in a ceremony at the White House conducted by Vice President Spiro Agnew.

Durham was 27 years old when he was killed in action in Vietnam in October, 1967.

Accepting the award for her son was Mrs. Grace Jolley of Orlando, Fla. The citation read:

This award is presented for the heroic action of Lt. Durham during combat operations in the Republic of Vietnam Oct. 17, 1967, with the 19th Aviation Squadron.

Durham had been in service in Vietnam two years as a specialist in helicopter maintenance, before returning to the States to attend Officers Training School. After receiving his commission, he immediately volunteered for duty again in Vietnam, and had been in the country only one week when he was killed.

Mr. Durham had been a frequent visitor here.

Tobacco Festival Opens November 24

The 18th annual Nicholas County Tobacco Festival will be held Sunday, Nov. 24, at the Carlisle Armory from 8 a.m. until 10 p.m., according to Robert E. Lott, festival chairman of the event.

Monday, Nov. 24, has been set as the opening date for the Turkey Bingo market. The date was determined last week at a meeting of the Sales Committee of the Turkey Auction Warehouse association held at Lexington.

Tobacco will be sold on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of that week, with the market closing Thursday, Thanksgiving day, and will open again Friday, November 28. Sales will continue until December 15, when the market will close until after Christmas, resuming Monday, Jan. 5.
