Small Help Host 3,500 Guests At Trieste

Sgt. J. J. Cassin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. Cassin, 221 N. Broadway, was host to more than 3,500 Italian and Yugoslavian guests aboard the stock aircraft carrier USS John F. Kennedy at Trieste, Italy.

The JFK averaged better than 1,000 guests per day during the visit to the northeastern Italy airport. More than 1,000 limited guests attended a flag retreat ceremony hosted by the commander of Carrier Division Two.

Highlights of the seven-day visit included several basketball, soccer and golf matches between Navy and local organizations, plus a special basketball attraction between an Italian girls team and sailors of the USS John F. Kennedy.

The JFK, America's newest aircraft carrier, was commissioned in 1966 and is presently serving as a unit of the U. S. Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean. The 3,200-man carrier, named for the 35th American President, is homeported at Norfolk, Va.
