Raise, demonstration, service, destruction, drift, hippies - is the motto of many farm youth groups today. They're the words you are often as you read about youth in the papers.

This is National 4-H Week. It is observed by more than 1 million boys and girls from 10 to 19 years of age, and some 25 million men and women who are 4-H members.

The 4-H program gives "Opportunity for All" to 1 million youth in the United States. They are red, yellow, black and white. They are from Indian reservations, ghettos, big cities, sprawling ranches, suburbs, hills and valleys, farms and small towns. Where they "plunge" 4-H they agreed to learn by doing the 4-H way, and they have.

These youth are building rather than tearing down. They are demonstrating to others how to prepare a better meal, grow better crops, raise better livestock, practice greater safety and build a better way of life.

Backstopping these future citizens and leaders of our country are several parents, volunteer leaders and the thousands of men and women employed by the Cooperative Extension Service who supervise and guide 4-H youth work.

Approximately 68 men and women in the county meet regularly with the 4-H club to help them with their project work and activities. Also, scores of private business enterprises have supported 4-H for half a century.
