### Maysville Tops Jacks Siberts' Out For Season

The hitting Maysville Bulldogs pulled a surprise to all Friday as they defeated out Blue-Jackets 9-6 at Maysville.

A three minute delay in the game pulled down the arena as Jacks had built up 8 and it became a long 41 minutes of football for the Maysville players.

After Eddie Beeler returned the opening kick-off to the Jacks 24, Bill Robinson drove the ball to the Jacks 32. Two of the Bulldogs defensive men broke through the line and new Spyder Marshall for a loss to the Jacks 20 and the punting unit came on.

Maysville started their drive on the 43 and several plays later Gordon Jones bowled over from the one foot line for the score. Steve Ruggart caught a pass in the end zone from Jones for the conversion and the Bulldogs led 8-0 with 3:45 remaining in the first half.

The Blue-Jackets had several drives but either a loss of yards or a penalty would let in the half. Jones scored from the yard line and the Jones to Ruggart pass won the game and Maysville led 16-0 at halftime.

The Bulldogs have game, and Jones set up one opportunity for the Bulldogs to score in the last quarter as he fell on two ten balls, he recovered one on the Blue-Jackets yardline and one play later a Jones to Ruggart 15 yard pass and a Jones conversion gave Maysville a 24-0 lead.

The Jacks have 4 more game remaining and it looks as though his career in high school football has ended.

David Ritchie returned a Maysville fumble but again the Jacks had to give up. This time for a 57 yard run but the conversion failed.

One more scoring blast came from Maysville as John Washington galloped 75 yards for the final Bulldog score. It was a little over 3 minutes left to play.

They say it's better to hurt than never and that proved to be right for Nicholas County as Eddie Beeler carried the ball 40 yards for the Jacks score within 3 seconds to be played on the game.

The final score stood Maysville 36, Nicholas County 6. This Friday Nicholas will meet Brown County here at 8:00 p.m.

Although the use of silver cups for drinking mint juleps is now a Kentucky tradition, there is no definite history as to how this came about. Its beginnings, as with so many traditions, are vague and uncertain.
