

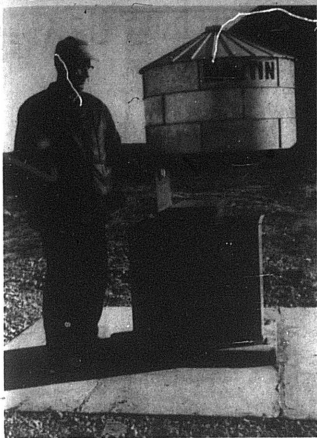

**PARKS STONE**, Locust Grove Road, checks his recently installed electrically heated fountain. Water from the barn roof will be collected in the 14,000 gal. round metal cistern, sent to the background. "My pond won't hold water and my spring has dried up" is a common cry from many land owners. This fine installation is one answer to livestock water problems. The fountain allows 12 cows to drink at a time. Another fountain across the fence and not shown here, utilizes the same water and provides for hogs and cattle. They have upper and lower compartments for the livestock. The concrete slab, supported by crushed rock, will prevent the formation of a mud hole at the fountain. This installation was designed by the Soil Conservation Service and installed under the provisions of the Agricultural Conservation Program.

### Sayre Belts Jackets 70-0

The Sayre Spartans gained their seventh win and handed our Bluejackets their eighth loss in a 70-0 Friday afternoon. Sayre, who is now 7-1 on the season scored at least twice in every quarter.

The Spartan Senior quarterback Bruce Isaacs led the Spartans scoring in the first half, scoring twice. Sayre's first score came on Sophomore Henry Willis' 10 yard run. So-wen ran the two point conversion.

Isaac then went to work at the Spartan's quarterback deep into Bluejacket territory. Isaac scored on a 10 yard run and then passed to Lynn Martin for two more points. The Spartans led 16-0 at the end of the first quarter.

Isaac wasted no time in the second quarter as he passed for a 26 yard scoring play to Tim Bialley. Sayre scored again on an intercepted pass that Bill Martin ran for 20 yards and another scoring play.

Ricky Bryson found an open hole and scored from 21 yards out. Isaac's run added two more points.

Quarterback Isaac, topped off his day for the Spartans by scampering into the end zone on a five yard run. Isaac was used only once in the second half.

Sayre struck early in the second-half as Henry Willis capped his day by spending down field 85 yards on the opening kick-off for a score.

The Sayre freshmen played superb half as they took over for the last three quarters. It's for the Spartans, Tom Covatta took a three yard pass from Don Deardon and Frank Hanesey scored the two point conversion. After three quarters Sayre led 56-0.

For the final 14 points Don Deardon took a 25 yard pass from Tom Covatta and Brad Goode ran the conversion. On the final scoring play of the game, Goode scored on a two yard run and the final run accounted with the Jackets going down to defeat 70-0.

Next Friday the Jackets travel to Millerburg for an afternoon contest with the Cadets.
