

### Proof of Treachery

One of our contemporaries, Editor Ed Schergens of the TELL CITY (Indiana) News, after hearing a British speaker read an American article a thing or two, went back to his typewriter to pass on a few thoughts to his readers. We believe they are worth pondering by our readers, too.

Many Americans act like the ostrich. I think because they cannot see a threat, one does not exist. Yonick Blunden, a British journalist, did what he could to point out a danger most of us do not recognize. He said, "The whole atmosphere of America is one of hope." Then he emphasized, "but there is little to hope with the present Soviet regime."

The Englishman was speaking in Indiana on a visit to our state capital when he issued his warnings. He said Americans are unwilling to admit or recognize that the Soviets break commitments with everybody, friend and foe alike.

"The Soviet attitude of treachery has been proven time and again," said Mr. Blunden. "The Reds proved it by the Czech invasion, which was a breach of the Warsaw Pact of 1954. Americans seem not to be aware that Hungary, Poland and East Germany, as well as Czechoslovakia, are occupied by the Red army. And this is 14 years after the Hungarian revolution."

It is too bad this Englishman has to come among us and point out that "Americans are foolish to believe the Soviets are honest and honor treaties." We should be able to recognize the threat.

It is not in our nation to hope. But we should never be foolish enough to let our hopes take over in place of being alert. Not only should we recognize the unfaithfulness of the Communists, we should remain strong enough to repulse any move they would make against our society.

Honoring a word, either written or spoken, is not a Red quality. In all of our dealings with the Soviet Union, we should never forget these facts.

Field counts of alfalfa weevil eggs in the Lexington area are being made for this time of year. We hope they will not be had this year, but farmers are urged to be prepared and start spraying if necessary. Helli everybody who knows that. Even I no the that that germ can spend

An Informed Citizen  
 The eggs hatch in 6 to 7 weeks and the symphs drop to the ground and burrow in soil they live for 17 years or more underground. We use insecticides, carbaryl (TEPP) and TEP, are effective against alfalfa weevils. Carbaryl is quick as TEP, but it lasts longer and is less hazardous to bees. Prepare and use the sprays as follows: Carbaryl 200 WP use 12 pounds in 100 gallons of water and begin spraying in late April and begin raining. In 7 to 10 days they are ready to saw slots in tree limbs in which they lay eggs. Egg laying will continue for about a month when the adult then dies.

We had an Easter egg hunt and made rabbit sacks to carry our eggs in.

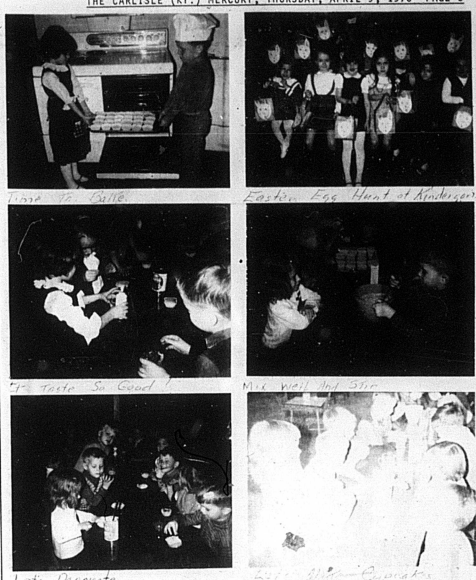
