Margie H. Wilson, Nicholas County Home Economics Extension Agent, has the answers to those questions:

"Homemakers clubs are made up of women of all ages who want to improve their homemaking skills, have a say in community affairs, change their family's living style, or do a better job of raising their children."

"Right now, there are eight Homemakers groups in Nicholas County, with a total of 119 members. Each club is what its members make it. They plan their own programs, make use of specially-trained volunteer leaders, myself and specialists from the University of Kentucky in carrying out these programs."

"We have many homemaking publications these women would find helpful. They are free of charge, can be loaned and picked up at the County Extension Office, located in the basement of the Post Office. They include a wide variety of subjects and skills such as: time and money management, clothing construction and buyability, foods and nutrition, housing and home furnishings, landscaping, home gardening, and many more."

'At Leisure'

NEW YORK—In Nicholas County a significant proportion of the able-bodied male population above the age of 14 is, by choice, not seeking or wanting work.

In the last ten years, the number of local people in this inactive category has risen considerably.

It is part and parcel of the trends all across the country, according to the latest figures from the Labor Department.

Most of these non-workers are retired people who have sufficient wherewithal or sources of income to enable them to lead lives of leisure. Some others, of course, are neither self-supporting nor interested in working. They represent a small portion of the total, however.

Of Nicholas County's male population over 14, the number of persons in the non-work class is estimated at 490.

Nationally, there are some 8,500,000 in this non-work, non-work group, a sharp increase over the 6,800,000 in 1960.

Much of it is attributed to the fact that more men are retiring when they reach 65. Only one year ago that age group was 64.

Of Nicholas County's male population over 65, the number who have retired has increased greatly since 1960, when the total was 267.

The major factor in enabling people to retire, in many cases, has been the rise in private and public pension programs in recent years.

The Institute of Life Insurance

reports that almost 44.5 million Americans were covered under such programs, other than social security, last year, a gain of 1.6 million in one year.

In addition, the non-work population has other sources of income, in varying measure. These include interest on savings, life insurance annuities, unemployment insurance, social security and veterans benefits.

As to the proportion of non-workers in the local male population, the latest figures place it at about 23 percent. In 1960 it was 19 percent.

Nationally, by way of comparison, the average is 14 percent.

Spencer Taylor, Barterville Injured In Truck Accident

Spencer Taylor, 64, of Barterville sustained a left leg injury, a fracture to the right arm and chest injuries about 12:20 a.m. Sunday in a head-on collision on U.S. 68, near Paris.

Three other persons were injured when a panel truck which was carrying another car collided head-on with a pick-up truck, driven by Mr. Taylor.

Others injured were Donald Miller, 26, of Apalachicola, Fla., who received lacerations of the face and mouth, injuries to the right knee, internal injuries and a possible fractured pelvis; his wife, Mrs. Edna Carol Miller, 20, who suffered a hip injury and lacerations and bruises; Michael Gregory, 23, a passenger in the Miller vehicle, who received a laceration of the left elbow and abrasions of the left arm.

All four were taken to the Bourbon County Hospital where Mrs. Miller and Taylor are listed in "good" condition. Miller was transferred to Central Baptist Hospital, Lexington, and Gregory was treated and discharged.

Deputy Sheriff Larry Harney said that the panel truck driven by Miller was traveling south on U.S. 68 when it collided head-on with the Northbound Taylor vehicle, causing it to run off the right side of the road. The car being towed by the Miller truck lacerated in the middle of the right wheel and blocked the road for about one and one-half hours.

Watts Announces L.V.C.A.C. Grant

Congressman John C. Watts announced this week that a grant from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to the Lexington Valley Community Action Council in the amount of \$130,166 had been made.

It will serve the counties of Frank, Bracken, Fleming, Mason, Menifee, Montgomery, Nicholas and Robertson.

3,000 Telephone Calls To Be Made By Wildlife Resources, Frankfort

Sometime between April 27 and May 8, 3,000 Kentuckians will get a telephone call from the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources in Frankfort.

The purpose of a party project to determine the amount of game killed by Kentucky hunters during the past year. All calls will be made between 5:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.

The secretaries who call will want to know if there is a hunter in the household, and if so, will cooperate with the Department in compiling information for the annual game harvest survey, explained Carl Kays, the biologist handling the project.

Hunters who agree to help will be mailed a questionnaire listing the species of game hunted in the state and asked to report the number of animals or game birds killed and the number of hunting trips taken during the year.

Information gleaned from returned questionnaires helps game management biologists determine the length of future hunting seasons and set other policies affecting hunters, Kays said.

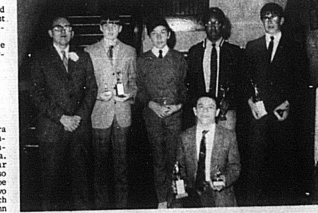
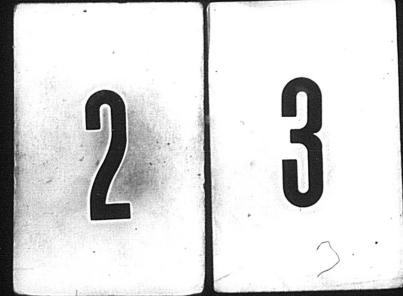
