National Forest Recreation Permit

A new type annual permit that allows individuals or families to use designated facilities in National Forest and Grassland Recreation Areas is being sold by the local ASCS county office, says Harvey Wagener, Chairman of the Nicholas County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASCS) Committee. The permit is also valid on designated areas of the National Park Service, Sports, Fisheries and Wildlife Refuge, and Bureau of Land Management Lands.

The new permit is good for an entire family or carload of people and partially replaces the Golden Eagle Passport of prior years which will not be issued again until 1971.

Price of the permit, good until Dec. 31, 1970, is \$7.00. Revenues from sales go into the

Land and Water Conservation Fund.

The new National Forest Recreation Permit will admit purchasers to the use of recreational areas and services of the Four Federal Agencies, except for special day-use services and facilities and a few areas operated by concessionaires.

Typical Forest Service facilities and services that the permit covers are camp and picnic facilities, bathroom and locker use, and boat-launching facilities. At National Forest campgrounds where the daily user fees \$2.00 or more, the permit will have a \$1 credit toward the campground fee. Special service fees such as locker rental, boat rentals, and electrical hookups at campsites may have an additional charge.

For areas administered by the

National Park Service, Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, and the Bureau of Land Management, the Forest Service Recreation Permit will entitle purchasers to the same services and facilities offered to buyers of the permits issued by these agencies. National Forests will honor interior agency permits.

"In no case, does the possession of a permit constitute a hunting or fishing license," Mr. Wagener said. "People hunting or fishing on the National Forests or other recreation areas covered by the permit must comply with applicable State regulations governing hunting or fishing license requirements, and Federal regulations concerning resource usage." ASCS is cooperating with the Forest Service in making the annual permit available to the public. The permit is also on sale at all Forest Service offices and visitor centers.

POLLUTION--Some extremists in their zeal to avoid additional billions to stop pollution in the air," says Gov. H. R.
