"That's why the motto this year is DO SOMETHING! The pain and misery and disability arthritis inflicts on so many is unnecessary. There is an enormous gap between what could be done about arthritis today and what is being done."

O'Connell said the Foundation Chapter would call on everybody in the community, individuals and business firms, to help in the 1970 Arthritis Do Something Drive, either by donating money or time or contributions of money.

"Statistics suggest that the day when we will triumph over this painful and disabling disease is not too far away," O'Connell promised. But, he said maximum help is needed now more than ever, and it is up to all of us to supply it.
