Kay's Kitchen

REMEMBER
This week the recipes are things I remember having as I grew up. I have tried them - they are simple and easy. The basic ingredients are those you can make most of as depending on your family. With cooler days ahead and tomatoes in abundance this is a good time to serve this.

FRESH TOMATO SOUP

2 cups of peeled, chopped tomatoes
1/2 to 1 cup water
4 cups milk
4 tablespoons butter
salt and pepper to taste
1 teaspoon sugar.
Bring all ingredients, except milk, to a boil and boil 5 minutes or until tomatoes are tender. Add milk, bring to boiling point, but do not boil.

SALMON PIE

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Use a single pie crust recipe for one prepared minor stick. Anyway have the pastry chilled. Beat together 2 eggs and 1 cup milk. Add one can of salmon to make. Be sure you carefully separate into pieces and remove all bone and skin. Mix well and pour into a chilled pastry shell. Bake about 30 minutes. Pie should be firm but not dry.

CHICKEN A LA KING

Fryers are an economical buy so give your family a treat and serve chicken a la king in style. One chicken will go far served this way. Wash and simmer chicken, 1 lb. head, 1 lb. of celery, and 1 lb. of pepper for about 45 minutes if cooked whole. Cool in broth, then cut into small pieces.

Make a cup or more of cream sauce (depends on amount of chicken). Saute 1 tablespoon of minced onion, 1 can of drained mushrooms, 1/4 cup diced green onion, 1/4 cup oil, add 2 eggs in butter until limp; add to sauce. Add chicken, diced pimento and add 2 tablespoons of sherry. When making the sauce use half milk and half chicken stock.

Serve to party abella, you can buy frozen ones or make your own by using rice blanching dough or pastry rolled thin and cut with a No. 2 1/2 size can. Put pastry over inverted fourth third, put eggs and bake at 425 degrees in vary with thickness of pastry. You know you can serve the chicken on hot buttered toast.

CREAMY RICE PUDDING

1 quart milk
1/3 cup rice
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 cup white raisins
Put rice in sieve and let hot water run through it. Butter a deep pyrex dish, add all ingredients. Bake at 325 degrees for three hours. Stir several times during the first hour to keep rice from settling on the bottom. If you like it a bit sweeter serve with brown sugar and cream.

AFTER-SCHOOL SANDWICH

Try this for an after-school sandwich for the children. Shredded cabbage, shredded carrots, ground sautéed peppers mixed with mayonnaise. It tastes better than it looks.
