## Auditors Report City In The Red

Sugg and Nolan Auditors submitted a six month financial report Monday night to City Council which shows the General Fund to be approximately \$5,000 in the red as of June 30, 1970.

The General Fund is supported mainly by City tax moneys. It pays the Police Department, Street and Alley all expenses not related to the utilities such as position of office personnel salaries.

Council voted to transfer \$1440 a part of the professional auditor's charge, to the General Fund and the utilities share of this cost. The utility funds were reported to be in good financial shape. But, these funds cannot be used as back-up in the General Fund.

Sugg and Nolan was hired until the end of the year at \$50 per week by a 4-2 vote of Council. Charles Wilson and Clifton Waugh voted against the motion because they felt that the City office could now take over the accounting and book-keeping systems to save the \$50 fee. The four remaining Council members felt that the City required these professional services.

The auditor also suggested that a Payroll Account be opened at the bank. Council voted 6-0 to do so.

Council voted 4-1 to instruct City Attorney, Jack Conley, to draw up an ordinance and start legal proceedings to annex the Berry and Paul properties on East Main Street. Annexation was the condition required by Harrison Steer for his right-of-way to permit the City sewer to be continued through his property. Clifton Waugh voted against the motion and Richard did not vote.

In order to place the annexation question on the docket for September 7, the ordinance must be passed by Council and be printed in the newspaper. The ordinance must be filed by Sept. 5. Thereafter a called meeting of Council will be required to meet the deadline.

Ralph Stearner appeared before Council to request assistance in keeping ambulance service in the County. He said that the expense of doing so has become so great that he is forced to stop the Fiscal Court and City Council to subsidize the service. His suggestion is that a per capita rate be paid by each group according to the 1970 census results. Council decided to study the matter further before making a final decision.

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## 710 Veterans In County

There are 710 veterans in Nicholas County and 382,000 in the State of Kentucky, according to J.C. Ratliff, Director of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Louisville. The tabulation is based on America's 27.3 million former servicemen as of the beginning of 1970.

According to the latest available figures, some 90 Nicholas County and 55,000 Kentucky veterans were in service during the Korean Conflict.

There are 77,000 Korean Conflict veterans in the State. Of these, 12,000 also saw service in World War II. In Nicholas County, there are 150 Korean Conflict veterans of whom 10 saw service in World War II.

World War II veterans make up the largest group of veterans with 330 from Nicholas County, and 190,000 from Kentucky.

Some 70 Nicholas County and 48,000 Kentucky veterans saw military service only between the Korean Conflict and the Vietnam Era (Feb. 1, 1953 to Aug. 4, 1964).
