

### City To Hire

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The bills were approved after amending two of them. One was not reauthorized and rebid. Another was \$110 worth of hand soap. Heron was asked to request that the company selling the soap be asked to accept his return.

Gene Kelley made a motion to discontinue all free telephones to City employees. The motion died for lack of a second. The Council referred the matter to further study by the Finance Committee for discussion and recommendation at the next Council meeting.

Council passed unanimously a motion to advertise for bids for high-test gasoline for City use.  
A gas engine had arrived which was purchased to aid in locating gas leaks. The device will cost approximately \$250 according to Heron. He is hopeful in prospecting leaks. However, holes have to be drilled in the ground in order to find the leaks. The purchase of another device which could find leaks on top of the ground, was referred to Alex Crawford's Committee for study. This device, according to Heron, would cost around \$200.

Mrs. Booth submitted the recommendations of the Streets and Alleys Committee of which she is chairman, regarding the condition of City streets. The three pages listed the streets that needed repair and the order in which they should be done. Heron said the list was submitted to Heron. He emphatically stated that cold patching was needed in some areas as soon as the weather will permit. He stated that, for example, Sycamore Street off of Main was a danger. Heron said that if Paris and the State had had reasonable weather for this work, Carlisle has too. He also stated that certain streets were so badly in need of repair that something should be done, even if it would last only temporarily.

Several subjects were referred to the proper committee for consideration. Among these were: painting the back rooms of the City building, sick pay request from Earl Hunt, policeman; the mud situation on the Walnut side of Oliver Curry's home, obtaining school caution lights from the State Highway Dept.

The Johnson brothers appeared before Council as requested. They stated that they did have several county customers for trash pickups in Arnold and Liberty Heights. The consensus of opinion by Council was that these persons do not pay for the City Dump and therefore should not be allowed to use it. They were asked to sweep the main streets of the City more often as they agreed to do in their original contract.

City Clerk Chandler asked who was to be permitted the use of the key to the Dump. Mayor Powers asked that City persons as far as this could be determined. However, he emphasized that when persons do use the Dump they are asked to do so properly. Recently trash was strewn all over by a City resident who was given the key to the Dump use.

Henson was asked to dump a load of rock on the road leading to the Dump. Councilman Richard Hurt remained absent due to illness, and Councilman Charles Wilson arrived late because of a Williams at the school. The minutes of the last five adjourned meetings were read and approved.

### Council Recommendations For Gen. Service Super

Recommendations for duties of General Service Superintendent—2/2/70

1. Inventory of all materials in the barn and keep it updated quarterly.
2. Keep the equipment and supplies in the barn properly arranged and organized.
3. Submit a yearly request list of regular supplies and estimated amounts that will be needed. Submit at regular interval weekly job sheets for all.
4. Make work sheets available to be kept for each employee showing time and wages for the job done. This should be material filling file for pay period.
5. Make weekly check of streets and signs for needed repairs.
6. Repair Gas Leaks immediately, even if overtime is required.
7. Repair Water Leaks immediately, even if overtime is required.
8. Keep salt supply in the winter months and use as needed to suit traffic conditions for all citizens.
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10. Establish a rotating work schedule for staff for week and emergency services. (Each person could be off 2 weekends and on one.)
11. Keep proper records to comply with the gas company regulations.
12. Be cooperative with all employees and customers to establish good will.
13. Only City work is to be done with City Equipment and Personnel. (With the use of available equipment and personnel, we can make a good showing in the beautification of Carlisle by putting our shoulder to the wheel.)
14. The Council reserves the right to revise or amend these duties as needed.

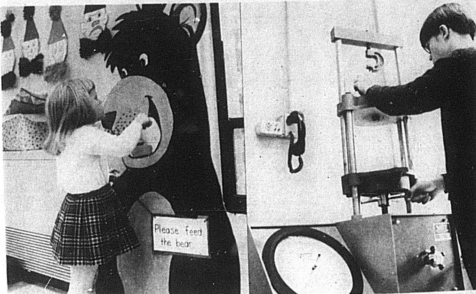
### Nicholas Clips Sayre 68-58
