Rep. Wenz Is One of Four Proposing Park Lodge

State Representative Austin Wenz, along with three of his colleagues in the Kentucky House of Representatives, yesterday introduced a bill requesting the Kentucky Department of Parks to build a lodge at Blue Licks State Park.

Collaborating with Rep. Wenz in the resolution were Rep. Sherman Arnet, of Clearfield; Rep. Brooks Hinkle, of Paris; and Rep. John Swinford, of Cynthiana.

WHEREAS, Blue Licks State Park, located in Robertson County, is the only state park in that area of the Commonwealth; and

WHEREAS, Blue Licks State Park is ideally situated for development as a major park due to its location near population centers in northern and central Kentucky; and

WHEREAS, the 100 acre tract is unspoiled area of quiet forest scenes spread over the foothills of Kentucky, appearing today much as it did when herds of buffalo followed the trail to the salt springs at Blue Licks; and

WHEREAS, the Park is located on the site of the battle of Blue Licks, which was fought on Aug. 19, 1782 and was the last battle of the American Revolution; and

WHEREAS, the Blue Lick Springs were the site of a fashionable resort hotel in the nineteenth century; and

WHEREAS, within a few miles of the park can be found the famous covered bridge of Fleming County, Kentucky, which are among the few remaining in this country and are justifiably described as providing a magnificent view of great historical interest; and

WHEREAS, there is located

within a few minutes drive of the park the historic town of Washington, Kentucky, whose buildings of the Post Revolutionary War period have been artfully and faithfully preserved for the edification of present and future generations and includes the home of Albert Sydney Johnson, the famous Civil War General.

WHEREAS, the present park facilities include picnic and play grounds, ranging from skeletons of Ice Age animals down to Kentucky Indian relics and artifacts; and

WHEREAS, the nucleus of a major state park already exists, so that only the erection of a lodge is needed to create a complete recreational facility; and

WHEREAS, the erection, operation and maintenance of such an installation would provide employment for many persons in the region;

NOW THEREFORE, Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

That the Kentucky Department of Parks be and it is hereby requested to erect, maintain and operate a lodge providing sleeping accommodations and restaurant facilities at the Blue Licks State Park.

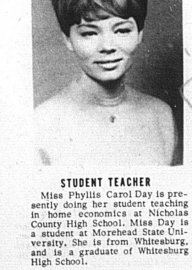
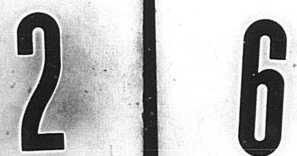
