Opposition To Cigarette Tax

Opposition to any increase in Kentucky's cigarette tax has been stated in a resolution adopted by the board of directors of the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative As-sociation.

The resolution did not refer specifically to any one of several proposals to increase the cigarette tax but said the co-op opposed "any increase."

An association spokesman said it was felt that tobacco, Kentucky's most profitable agricultural indus-try, should merit more consid-eration than to have additional tax pressures placed against a product which used hundreds of millions of pounds of Kentucky leaf.

Kentucky's tobacco industry is already plagued by numerous, serious difficulties, and state offi-cials, as well as members of the legislature, have recognized the dangers of the state's economy should the industry's burdens be-come heavy enough to cause its collapse, the spokesman said, ad-ding:

"We hope official Kentucky will be inclined to help solve the in-dustry's problems instead of im-posing an additional tax, which will result in lesser purchases of cig-arettes and therefore lesser use of Kentucky's tobacco."

An increase in the Kentucky tax also would be an open invitation, "an example for other states" to hit cigarettes with new taxes, al-ready so high in some states as to be viewed as punitive, rather than revenue measures, the directors noted in a discussion of the situa-tion which led to the resolution.

The resolution was passed at a meeting of the Burley Co-op's directors in Lexington Feb. 11.

\$148,300 for County Secondary Roads

Nicholas County has received a 1970-71 Rural Secondary Program allotment of \$148,300. Commis-sioner of Highways Eugene Goss announced today.

A \$60,000 portion of the money has been set aside for general maintenance of 45.6 miles of coun-ty roads.

Other projects included in the initial program are resurfacing of 2.9 miles of the Carlisle-Cynthiana Road (KY 32 and 36) and two bridges with approaches on East Union Road (KY 1285).

The Rural Secondary Program is financed by two cents of the seven-cent per gallon motor fuel tax. Revenue from the tax is di-vided among the counties on the basis of their rural road mileage, rural area and rural population.

Improvements made under the Rural Secondary Program are based on the recommendation of local fiscal courts.
