State Legislature

Convenes January 6

Work for the 1970 General Assembly continues to accumulate. Kentucky's lawmakers will be equipped for the Legislature's quickest start in history when they convene Jan. 6, perhaps paving the way for easing the traditional session's business of legislation.

The Legislative Research Commission staff has drafted more than 400 bills which are available for immediate introduction in the 1970 session, and LRC Director James T. Fleming says the number could reach 450 by convening time.

The Department of Finance has mailed to its lawmakers resumes of total budget requests by state agencies totaling \$1.7 billion higher than the revenue the state is now collecting and being them into line with estimated revenues.

Physical preparations are intensifying as both the Senate and House begin to get moving into their renovation prior to the session.

The LRC staff is the administrative arm of the General Assembly but does physical preparations, as well as a clearinghouse for reports, and the introduction in the Legislature's interim committees of bills and other preliminary action and to make final recommendations in areas including legislation. The interim committee system is created with helping the 1970 General Assembly be one of the best-informed in years.

In recent action, the Legislature's interim committee on a domestic relations cover, with appointment of its members where appropriate.

However, the committee did not approve a draft of a bill creating court. The draft also called for juvenile matters to be taken out of county courts and placed under the jurisdiction of the new circuit domestic relations courts.

The Legislature's interim committee on Labor and Industry has recommended passage of legislation to allow public employees to bargain collectively with their government employers. The proposal would extend collective bargaining rights to all workers not covered by the National Labor Relations Act, with two qualifications: those having a strike, and those

Many income tax errors, particularly those that delay refunds, can be eliminated by using the pre-addressed label on forms received in the mail. Income tax returns with labels can be quickly identified and processed since they contain necessary identifying information. Robert J. Dath, District Director of Internal Revenue for Kentucky, said today.

If your name or address has changed, make the necessary corrections on the label and lightly scribble through the wrong pre-printed information. If you have a refund due, this will help insure delivery of the check to the correct address.

Taxpayers should also verify that their correct social security number is entered on the return they file.

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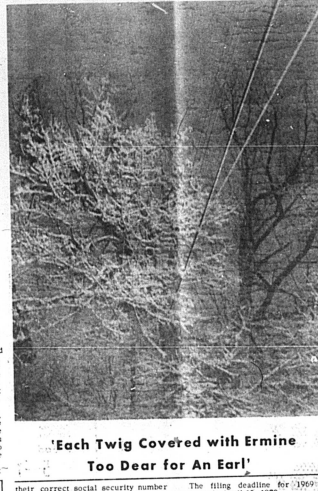
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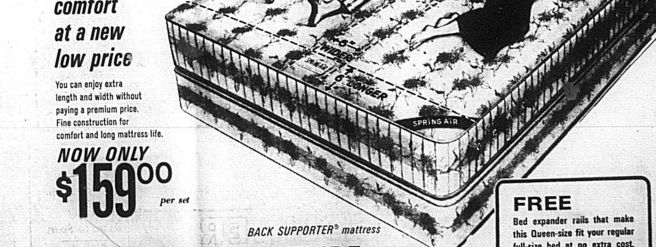
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
