Council Votes To Have Books Audited; Now Seeking Two for Permanent Jobs

In a series of motions Monday night, City Council voted to have Yeager, Ford & Warren audit the books, advertise for applicants for the position of City Clerk-Treasurer, and hire Mrs. Margaret Wade as an temporary full-time City Clerk-Treasurer until a replacement is found. Since Mrs. Ann Harper had stated that she would take no less than a \$75 a month increase, Council voted to call a 575 a month meeting was called to order, the Mayor (Harper) for an audit, Councilman Gene Kelley voted against the motion because he wanted Richard Hunt remain absent because of illness.

Council has passed a motion, 5-0, to advertise for applicants for the position of Clerk-Treasurer at a salary of \$500 per month.

Your attention is called to advertisement on page 3 for a new City Clerk-Treasurer.

Mrs. Harper was asked if she would remain in the position until the audit could be found. She said she would not. She stated that she would be her key to Mayor Bill Power as quickly as the audit could be completed. She then left the meeting.

Mayor Power then called for an adjournment since no City Clerk was present. Council recessed until 10:30 a.m. and proceeded to hire G. O. Mrs. Wade as temporary full-time Clerk-Treasurer until a new Clerk-Treasurer could be appointed. Her salary was set at \$150 per hour. Another motion later in the meeting gave her the authority to make out the payroll checks which are due to be paid on Jan. 15.

Mrs. Wade was questioned by the Councilman regarding the present status of the office workload. Mrs. Wade stated that the gas and water that had not been sent out to date and that Mrs. Harper had taken some charts, which she said were hers, which would have helped considerably in the completion of the bigger bills.

Council then unanimously passed a motion to empower the Finance Committee to hire whatever help is necessary immediately at the City Office. The salary was to be decided by the Finance Committee of which Councilman Clifton Wugh is Chairman.

The Police force was re-elected once again and sworn in by the City Attorney, Alton Taylor. Past-time policemen are Earl Hunt, Billy Mack Cause and Orville Cause. The policemen were hired at their present salaries which will be reviewed with all other City employees on the July 1 date set up by the last Council.

Council unanimously decided to bond the City Clerk-Treasurer for \$5,000 and the Police Department for \$1,000.

On motion by Kelley and second by Both, Council unanimously voted to conduct meetings Monday night, 7:30 p.m. Robert's Rules of Order with the City Attorney serving as facilitator. On another motion, Council appointed Wugh as Mayor Pro-Tem until the first Monday in January, 1972. The Mayor Pro-Tem will act as Mayor if the Mayor is unable to discharge his duties. Councilman Wugh did not vote in Council action.

Another deadline was set for Jan. 15 and approximately 200 stickers had been sent to Carlisle. In the next month, Council will send the 425 parking stickers which the

previous Council had discontinued. Councilman Charles Wilson was the only dissenting vote, stating he believed more revenue could be obtained from the meters.

Mayor Power asked Council to appoint two of its members to serve with him on a committee which can review a fine or sentence given as a penalty for violation of a City Ordinance. Council appointed Wugh and Alton Crawford as both members of the Police and Fire Committee.

The Mayor read a letter of resignation submitted by Ronnie Lee Lawson on Jan. 13. He stated that Lawson might be persuaded to remain as assistant to the Water Works Supervisor, Oliver Vice, if he were given a \$50 a month raise. Lawson was asked if he would be willing to remain at his present salary until the July reviewing date. He replied negatively and Council accepted his resignation. It then passed a motion to advertise for applicants for the position of a salary of \$550 per month.

Mayor Power mentioned that there was a Municipal Seminar being held in Columbus this year at a cost of \$20 per person.

The meeting was adjourned until 3 p.m. Saturday afternoon at which time the applications will be considered for the position of City Clerk-Treasurer and City Clerk.
