The subcommittee also is considering establishment of a centralized or modular-type state printing operation which would be an effective use of state-owned printing equipment.

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**Committee Recommends Liberalizing Sunday Law**

The Legislature's Interim Committee on Cities has recommended that the 1970 General Assembly enact legislation which would amend the 1960 Sunday closing law.

The committee voted 5-4 to have a bill drafted and recommended that the bill be placed on the agenda of the General Assembly. The proposal would permit drug stores to open their doors on Sunday and sell any items legally available on Saturday.
