ALBURN. "Shakerown Revisited" is a colorful pageant about the South Union Shakers who created their own kind of devout Utopia in Russell County. Now in its eighth straight season, it tells the South Union story from the days of the Great Revival in 1800 to the movement's end in 1922. The songs, costumes and choreography are professionally done and completely authentic. It's part of the annual Shaker Festival that runs from July 7 through July 11 and includes exhibits of Shaker handicraft and tours of the Shaker settlement. Authentic Shaker food is served in the settlement's Center House (circa 1824) and the play is performed outdoors there. Curtain time is 8 p.m.

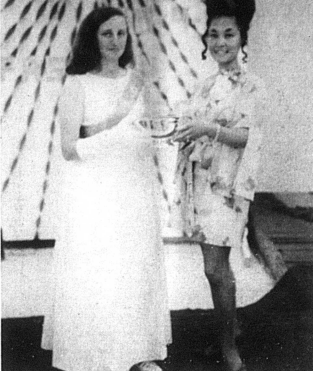
