Kay's Kitchen

There is no use putting it off--and I really can only give you suggestions, so for you who have asked me to write down how to make Hash, here I go.

HASH
When the left-over roast has reached the stage where it can no longer be sliced and there is always a part of the roast that always gets put aside, remove all fat and grate and cut in 1/2 inch cubes. Cut against the grain whenever possible. Put on one side.

To 1 1/2 or 2 cups of meat you will need about three medium potatoes peeled and diced and three or four carrots pared and cut in slices. Cook potatoes and carrots together in enough water to cover well. Add salt and two Bay Leaves. If you like onion add about two, sliced medium thickness.

When vegetables are done, add meat and if you have any gravy left, if not add two or three bouillon cubes. I do not say. From now on it's you and your name but I always add generous dashes of Worcestershire Sauce, Lawry's Seasoned Salt, 1/2 tsp. Tabasco. At this stage the hash is thin so you will have to make "thickening" which is simply making a flour and water paste. Use about 3 or 4 tablespoons flour and enough water to make a smooth, not too thin paste. Add to hash and stir until thick. You will need to taste again. I add a medium size can of drained cut mushrooms, a generous amount of Sweet Basil, pinch of marjoram, fresh ground black pepper and 2 tablespoons of fresh chopped parsley.

If you don't have fresh parsley, use same amount of dried.

This is small in itself. Serve sliced tomatoes sprinkled with Basil, and spoon oil and vinegar over all. Prepare about an hour before serving time so they can marinate. Hot corned steaks or if you don't want to use the oven on a hot day, make up corned beef and cook as in the "dogger" in hot bacon drippings in iron skillet. When brown turn, lower heat and cook golden brown and done in-side-out, about 20 minutes. Time depends on size of steaks.

Make the hash in the morning when it is cool and reheat at serving time. It also improves the flavor to reheat.

In the summer time, I usually serve a slice cake with whipped topping. Either Jam or Dat-mel Cake. In the winter, I serve Cherry Delight. This recipe was given to me by a friend of mine and even if you are serving the meat in the kitchen, get your husband and make it look extra pretty. Even you will forget the whole meal started out with a left-over roast!

BEef RISsoles
If hash is not your dish, try this. Put left-over meat thru meat grinder. Make about a cup of well seasoned medium white sauce. Add enough to meat to moisten. Add seasonings to taste: Lawry's Worcestershire Sauce, one small grated onion, salt and pepper.

Shape into croquettes about three inches long and roll in cornmeal. Refrigerate until time to cook. Pan fry in melted butter until brown. member butter browns quickly, so don't have heat too high.

This meat mixture is also good to use for stuffed green peppers. However I don't think this is a good time to serve green pepper. Wait until home grown ones are on the market. The last time I tried them, they were so high you could have added a few cents and bought steak!

SUMMER SQUASH (SKILLET SQUASH AU GRATIN)
It is wonderful to have friends supply you with one of your favorite vegetables when they even include a new recipe that is really something!

1/4 cup butter
4 cups thinly sliced squash
1 thinly sliced onion
salt and fresh ground black pepper
1/4 cup water
2 teaspoons Soy Sauce
Meat butter in skillet, add squash, onion, salt, pepper and water.

Cook covered about 15 minutes (until tender). Sprinkle with cheese and Soy Sauce. When cheese melts it is ready to serve. (Good)
