4-H Camp Receives \$2,000 Grant To Construct New Resource Center

CARLISLE, KY.—One farmer's efficiency has turned out to be a bonus for thousands of Kentucky boys and girls.

French W. Richard, Winchester farmer and seedman, was recently named winner of the 1970 Ford Farm Efficiency Award in tobacco. Richard, one of 15 national winners, elected to present the \$2,000 Ford Motor Company Fund grant to the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture to use at its North Central 4-H Camp in Nicholas County.

In accepting the check, Dr. Charles E. Barnhart, dean of the UK College of Agriculture, praised Mr. Richard and the Ford Motor Company for their contribution. "This kind of support is more than just improved facilities, it's a meaningful investment in the future of Kentucky's youth—their education, recreation, and well-being," the dean added.

The message struck home, for some 250 young campers gave Mr. and Mrs. Richard a long and resounding applause after the brief ceremony.

The grant will be used in the construction of a resource center in the camp. The proposed two-story structure will contain the

camp manager's office, and several activity rooms for permanent nature exhibits and craft work areas, according to Conrad Felner, UK 4-H department.

The camp serves the northern and northeastern Kentucky counties, and about 3,000 youngsters attend the camp each summer. The Ford Motor Company Fund

Senate Amendment To Abolish Tobacco Program Defeated

Wednesday, July 8, as the Senate neared final vote on the Fiscal Year 1971 Appropriations Bill for the Department of Agriculture, Senator Frank Moss of Utah offered an amendment to the bill which would have destroyed the tobacco program. The amendment prohibited funds for tobacco price support, grading and inspection promotion of tobacco exports and sale of tobacco under Public Law 480 (sale for local currency to foreign countries). The amendment was defeated 52 to 15.
